MINUTES

UNOFFICIAL

(The minutes are unofficial until they are approved at the 2018 Annual Meeting)

I. OPENING HYMN AND PRAYER

After the opening hymn, Father Dodge led the members present in prayer.

II. CALL TO ORDER BY THE RECTOR

The meeting was called to order at 4:09 p.m.

III. APPROVAL OF MINUTES OF THE 2017 ANNUAL MEETING

The 2017 Minutes were approved by the members present.

IV. VESTRY PRESENTATION OF NOMINEES

Father Dodge presented Grant Macdonald lithographs to the retiring Vestry members, Sandra Brinck and Jack Lott, and thanked them for their service. Paul D'Arcy, whose term is ending, is eligible to serve a full term on Vestry as he was completing an unexpired term.

The slate of nominees was presented: Paul D'Arcy, Guy Gronquist, and Heidi Hahn. Father Dodge asked for any further nominations. Hearing none, Father Dodge requested the Vestry nominees be accepted by acclamation. Members present affirmed.

Father Dodge also announced the 2017 Deanery Delegate candidates: Penni Chambers and Ray Wallace. The motion to accept the candidates passed unanimously. Penni and Ray will be joining the existing delegates Marty Buchsbaum, Charles Chambers, and Chris Frenk.

In answer to the question raised by Marty Buchsbaum, members of the Deanery serve a three-year term.

V. RULES OF ELECTION AND BALLOTING AND THE FIRST BALLOT - FATHER DODGE

Since there were no other nominations and both the Vestry and Deanery Delegation candidates were accepted unanimously Father Dodge stated that it was not necessary to go over the rules of election and balloting.

VI. AMENDMENT TO THE BY-LAWS

Father Dodge spoke briefly about the work of the Vestry toward considering an amendment to the by-laws that would establish a second endowment fund. He explained the required three consecutive monthly votes by the Vestry before presenting the amendment to the Annual Meeting. Father Dodge stated that the Finance Committee had also endorsed the amendment.

Clarke Fountain motioned to accept the amendment and the motion was seconded by Jack Lott.

Asenath Kepler and Camille Barnett spoke about their concerns with the change to the by-laws.

Ray Wallace spoke of the changes to the by-laws in 2007 and his support of the new endowment.

Asenath Kepler motioned to table the vote, which was seconded by Randall Hayden. Janet Sanders asked that the vote be taken by secret ballot. Some suggested that the motion to table be withdrawn to allow for further discussion, but the suggestion was declined. Charles Chambers suggested that a better motion would be a motion to reconsider at a later date in order to allow more work to be done on the issue and presented at a later time, to which Asenath and Randall assented. Paper ballots were then distributed, with a “yes” vote being in favor of postponement, and a “no” vote in favor of continuing the discussion. The annual meeting continued while the ballots were counted by the tellers.

VII. FINANCIAL REPORTS - BOB BUDDENDORF, TREASURER

Treasurer's Report for 2017

Bob Buddendorf reported there was Net Income from Operations in 2017 of \$22,728 compared with a budgeted amount of \$9,080. He also reported the fulfillment of a \$30,000 gift to St. Bede's, the daughter church of Holy Faith, for renovations.

The parish is in a strong financial position at December 31 with cash on hand of \$383,900 and no debt. The value of the Endowment Fund at year-end was \$4,789,000 including approximately \$1.2 million attributable to the Scheffler Trust which is restricted as to its use. The investment return was a positive 16.7%, net of fees, for 2017.

Presentation of 2018 Budget

Bob reported that we again are presenting a balanced budget for Holy Faith for the year 2018. The 2018 budget was approved by the Vestry at the January 25, 2018 meeting.

There were discussions/questions regarding the Library income from the Scheffler Trust, tithing for Mission & Outreach, and how to become a grantee of the Mission & Outreach Ministry. The question, “Do we have numbers comparing the income and expenses of members?” was also raised.

Father Dodge expressed his thanks to Bob for all of his hard work.

It was then announced that the result of the ballots was in favor of postponement of the vote on the amendment to the by-laws.

VIII. PARISH REPORTS - FATHER DODGE

Father Dodge spoke of efforts to find a priest to fill the third clergy position. Three calls have been extended. However, two of the priests declined because they did not want to move to Santa Fe, and the third had a commitment to a congregation that the bishop insisted be honored.

Father Dodge spoke of the important diocesan role of Holy Faith, the diocesan commitments of both clergy and parishioners, and the changes we will see with a new bishop.

Father Dodge thanked the Vestry who have been faithful stewards of Holy Faith. He commended them on their work towards the amendment to the by-laws. He also expressed his surprise by the opposition to the amendment after opportunities to raise questions at the Forum discussion, a Legacy Society presentation, and in response to the announcements in the Sunday bulletins. He also shared that there had been an intended \$100,000 gift to fund the new endowment, but he will now go back to the donor to determine how and if the gift can be used, always mindful of honoring donor intent.

The Vestry has also been supportive of Father Dodge's proposal to move the Baptismal Font to the entrance of the church. By the font's placement at the entrance of the church, theologically we are reminded that it is through baptism that we enter the Body of Christ. At the same time, plans are in process to refinish the floors of the nave and the pews. This work may require worshiping in Palen Hall for a period of time.

IX. THE RECTORS'S CHARGE TO THE PARISH

Father Dodge's charge to us is the advice from Scripture: Fear not. Do not be afraid. God is doing a new thing. God is in charge, so fear not. We have Jesus Christ as the head of this Body, so do not be afraid. God is making all things new. Thanks be to God.

X. CLOSING PRAYER AND BLESSING

Father Dodge gave the closing prayer and blessing.

XI. ADJOURNMENT

The meeting was adjourned at 5:05. After the closing hymn, all were invited to a wonderful potluck dinner.

**RULES FOR THE ELECTION
OF PERSONS TO THE VESTRY
AND AS DEANERY/DIOCESAN DELEGATES**

RESOLVED – The rules for the election of persons to the Vestry and as Convention Delegate will be as follows:

1. All votes cast shall be on ballots furnished by the Church.
2. Each ballot must show votes for the exact number of persons specified for that ballot, or that ballot will be considered invalid and shall not be counted.
3. Prayer shall precede each ballot.
4. The procedure for counting the ballots is:
 - a) The retiring Vestry members will count the ballot. One of the counters will serve as teller and will call out the vote on each ballot. The remaining two counters will each record the votes.
 - b) The teller reads the ballot; the counters simultaneously record the count. Each candidate's name is marked on each counter's list as the names are read out.
 - c) The counters' totals are tallied producing the top 3 vote getters.
5. The Teller shall report to the Rector, in writing, after each ballot has been counted and verified, providing the following information.
 - a) The total number of valid ballots cast.
 - b) The number needed for election, being a majority of the number of valid ballots cast.
 - c) The total number of votes received by each nominee.
6. The Rector shall declare as elected any nominee who has received a majority of the number of valid ballots cast.
7. The Rector shall not announce the vote total of any nominee at any time, nor shall the Teller, unless this ruling is overturned by a two-thirds majority of eligible members present.
8. On each succeeding ballot, the candidate with the lowest total of votes shall be dropped from the ballot until all new places have been filled. This entire procedure will apply to both Vestry and Delegate positions.



Associate Rector Report

The Reverend Jim Gordon

Lay Pastoral Visitors

The Lay Pastoral Visiting Team reaches out to parishioners who are temporarily or permanently homebound. Many of the Visitors are authorized to take Communion to the homebound as well to supplement the visits of the Parish Clergy. Visits to the homebound include Communion brought each Sunday to residents at El Castillo Retirement Community. This past year, faithful Communion bearers who continued this work were Randall Hayden, Alice McSweeney, Grant Macdonald, Ed Colson, Charles and Penni Chambers, and Allyson Adams. Parishioners who may feel called to this important and rewarding ministry should contact Associate Rector Jim Gordon.

Sunday Forums

In 2018, Holy Faith made major strides to return the Sunday Forums to an emphasis on Christian formation – in an artful fashion. Added to presentations by Fr. Jim and Fr. Robin, and others, were those given by parishioner Cissy Lewis, who taught the spiritual poetry of such Christian luminaries as John Donne, T.S. Eliot, Gerard Manley Hopkins, Mary Oliver and Robert Herrick. Plans for the current year include either a breakfast or fellowship Sunday – usually the first Sunday of the month – and a designated Art Forum Sunday – usually the second Sunday of the month. We're also looking into the possibility of bringing in outside speakers to discuss Christian literature.

Men of Holy Faith

In 2018, this young group continued to meet monthly for food, fellowship and lively discussions on timely topics. Among those meeting regularly were Guy Gronquist, Jim Vaughan, Simon Mostert, Ray Wallace, Dan Green, Steve Gredell, Burt Lehman, Marcus Parker, Jack Lott, Gary Moran, George Amos, Fr. Communications Committee

The Communications Committee, chaired by Cathy Gronquist, met regularly throughout the year to make sure that areas and events of importance to the parish were covered fully, either via the website (www.holyfaithsf.org), on Facebook, for publication in the "Faithway" or via other means, such as in the bulletin. Our photographers try to be there to capture the rich life of the Parish, but we are very open to photographs from our church community, as well.

As a group we are committed to sending the message of Holy Faith out beyond our walls. Photographs and stories are regularly seen in the Diocese of the Rio Grande's e-bulletin, "In the Loop." The website is regularly updated and we do hope that the parish will use this resource more regularly.

Members of the committee are: Cathy Gronquist, Marty Buchsbaum, Jim Vaughan, Janet Sanders, Jim Overton, Lora Morton, Fr. Jim and Fr. Robin. The committee suffered a major loss in 2018 with the death of our friend Alexandra Ward, who contributed to the committee and to our church in myriad ways.

Faith Family

In 2017 Fr. Jim led the reorganization of the parish's Faith Friends initiative, renaming it the Faith Family Ministry. The purpose of this ministry is to provide assistance for parishioners with time-limited needs due to an injury or post-operative situation who have inadequate local help from family, friends, or neighbors. A wide range of services is offered including prayer, making phone calls, cooking meals, driving to appointments, etc.

In 2018 the ministry spent several months spearheading help for a beloved Holy Faith member in desperate need. The help was both physical and financial. Deacon's Report

The Rev. Deacon Patricia Masterman

This has been a wonderful year at Holy Faith serving as your Deacon. There have been many new experiences in ministry and I look forward to this New Year as my involvement in parish life continues to grow.

Deacon of the Mass

Serving as Deacon of the Mass at Holy Faith has included fifty-eight services, usually alternating between the 8:30 a.m. and 11 a.m. Mass, preaching three times and giving a meditation on the Seven Last Words during Good Friday. On July 1 I served at St. Paul's Peace in Las Vegas, NM as Deacon of the Mass and Preacher. I was Deacon of Word on October 1 during the Diocesan Convention service at St. John's Cathedral in Albuquerque, and St. Andrew's Episcopal Church in Lake Worth, FL on December 2. During the year I also assisted with two funerals in the parish.

Pastoral Visits

I have assisted the Rector and Associate Rector with three Pastoral Visits (home and hospital visits).

Borderland Ministry

The Deacons of the Diocese of the Rio Grande have continued collection of food, clothing, monetary funds and other necessities throughout the Diocese which are periodically dispersed to the churches along our borders. A Borderland Summit was held in El Paso, TX in hopes of involving other denominations in this endeavor. Attended a regional meeting held at Holy Faith.

Commission on Ministry of the Baptized

Bishop Hunn has appointed me for the third year to serve on COMB as the only Deacon. I am also charged with mentoring those in the process to become Deacons. It is indeed an honor to serve the Diocese in this capacity.

Other Activities

In February, Deacon Lane Perdue and I gave a presentation about the history and liturgical duties of Deacons at a Sunday Forum. I have attended eight meetings of the Interfaith Leadership Alliance (ILA) and I am serving on a subcommittee to explore options for their Envision Program; attended the Installation of the new Rector at Holy Family; participated in "March for our Lives" at the Santa Fe Plaza (March 24); participated in the Multi-Faith Service for Immigration Justice (May 1); attended Open House at the Mosque (May 13); participated in an Interfaith Worker's Blessings at the Round House (September 3); performed a House Blessing (October 26) for a parishioner; attended a Service of Remembrance at Temple Beth Shalom in memory of those killed at Tree of Life Synagogue in Pittsburgh; attended a Faith Leaders Luncheon at St. Vincent Foundation (12/19); and attend weekly staff meetings.

I attended the Annual Clergy Retreat in February and the Clergy Conference in September, held at the Bosque Center.

I have also led eight services at two nursing care facilities in Santa Fe – Kingston and Casa Real – alternating with Santa Fe's denominational clergy.

On September 19 the Women's Spirituality group began classes "Women of the Bible" which concluded December 5. Approximately 17 women registered for the class and 6 completed it. Due to the unexpected death of my granddaughter in early November, Anita Pisa offered to lead the final three classes in my absence. I am so very grateful to Anita for bringing the classes to closure.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank Fr. Robin, Fr. Jim and the office staff for their continued warm welcome to share in ministry of Holy Faith. Most of all, I wish to thank each of you attending this Holy place for your loving support throughout the year, and especially for your love and compassion for my family during this time of grieving. Together we will continue to serve our worship community, and the community at large with joyful hearts and God's love.

SENIOR WARDEN REPORT

Give us grace, O Lord, to answer readily the call of our Savior Jesus Christ and proclaim to all people the Good News of his salvation, that we and the whole world may perceive the glory of his marvelous works; who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen.

The Collect for today is the charge we are given in this parish church from the Book of Common Prayer to answer the call to proclaim salvation in this city and in this world. It is one that I believe Holy Faith has responded to readily and I believe and pray will continue to respond to eagerly. As many people remark upon entering into the church, the presence of the Holy Spirit is palpable.

This is the third time I have had the privilege of presenting the Senior Warden's report. In preparing it, I looked back at my first report in January 2012, when I remarked that "Much has been accomplished this year... For the first time in many, many years, Holy Faith ended the year [2011] with a balanced budget... The Vestry also reviewed the bylaws and is proposing changes that will...protect the endowment from being plundered in the future as it was once some time ago in the past."

Since that time, intervening Vestries have continued to follow best practices and exercise good stewardship, not only for the present but looking ahead to the generations yet to come. Responding to concerns that were raised at the last Annual Meeting about a proposed change to the by-laws, the Vestry has exercised its canonical authority to establish an Endowed Reserve Fund. This fund, which is separate from the Endowment Fund, will operate alongside and under the same prudential constraints as the Endowment Fund. It will allow income, defined as an average of four percent of the rolling three-year year-end balances, to be used to support capital, mission & outreach or operating expenses, at the discretion of the Vestry of the day. Donors who have expressed the wish that their legacies and/or donations be endowed with the possibility of the income supporting operating expenses will now have a vehicle for their intent to be honored. But, for the avoidance of doubt, the Endowment Fund will remain open for donations.

The other major accomplishment that the Vestry achieved since the last annual meeting has been the endorsement of the Rector's call of Mtr Pam Graham to be Associate Rector. For the first time since the retirement of Dean Peggy and the untimely death of Canon Semon, the parish will enjoy a full complement of three ordained stipendiary priests. We owe a debt of gratitude to Fr Robin, Fr Jim, Fr Murphy and Deacon Pat for their diligent care while we were without a second Associate Rector.

Finally, I must thank the Parish for the opportunity to serve on the Vestry again. It has been a blessing to be able to work with fellow Vestry members, members of the Finance Committee, Investment Committee and the Executive Committee: Fr Robin, Junior Warden Paul D'Arcy and Treasurers Bob Buddendorf and Penni Chambers.

Guy Gronquist, Senior Warden

JUNIOR WARDEN REPORT

In the year 2018 there were several major remedial actions and improvements made to our church.

Beginning at the first of the year, Fr. Robin requested we explore the feasibility of moving the Baptismal Font from the northeast corner of the nave to the middle aisle of the nave near the main entrance to the church. Although the stone font weighs approximately 200 pounds, there was a concern that over time, the weight could adversely impact the floor, so the condition of the sub-floor and foundation were examined. Two issues were found: first, the floor joists were twisted and rotted, and secondly, asbestos material used to cover the floor joists when the central heating plant was below the floor in the nave had not been removed when the furnace had been relocated. Both conditions needed attention regardless of whether the font was moved. The existing floor and the pews also needed attention, and to gain access to the floor joists and foundation work required much of the floor along with the pews would have to be removed.

Work on removing the asbestos began in February. Fr. Robin was adamant about completing the entire project by the first Sunday of Pentecost, May 20th. With the pews removed off-site for repair and touching up, access holes in the floor of the nave provided the ability to repair the floor joists and supporting beams. For three weeks, Holy Services were moved to Palen Hall. Thanks to Mark Childers the services in Palen Hall were beautifully organized so the temporary relocation was not a hardship.

Lighting was installed to illuminate the baptismal font in its new location and the altar piece on the back wall of the nave. Carpentry was required to shorten the last two rows of pews to provide clearance around the font for processions. The material from the shortened pews was used to build 4 chairs which can be added to the seating in the altar area. A new prefinished hard-wood oak floor was installed over the old floor which helped reduce the repair time. The nave was repainted, the pews installed, and the sanctuary was ready for Sunday services, May 6th.

The project came in on schedule and under budget. It was accomplished by dedicated tradesmen, who added not only their skills but enthusiasm. There was evident also a "Guiding Hand."

The next project was waterproofing the foundation of Palen Hall facing Faithway St. Several cracks in the foundation suggested the need to shore up and protect the foundation. The planting area between Palen Hall and the sidewalk were dug up and a Bituthene waterproof membrane applied to the exposed foundation along with helical piers like those used in the sanctuary. In addition to the foundation work, a new steel door replaced the rotted wooden door, extensions of the downspouts were added to direct the water away from the foundation, new sidewalk areas to slope toward the street, and the removal of the door (no longer used) to the kitchen.

The first big rain of the season in July brought with it roof leaks in multiple areas. The roof on Conkey House received a new coating, the repair of the canales, and work on the downspouts were accomplished. On the main church building, two areas were repaired: 1) leaks in the kitchen resulting from cracks in the roofing around an air conditioning unit, and 2) leaks above the hallway outside the Sacristy, audio equipment closet, and the Vestry.

Finally, we added LED lighting to the front steps of the church. This was to provide both safety and security and high-light the entrance of our church from East Palace Avenue.

I want to express my appreciation and thanks to all members of our parish for their patience, advice and council while these projects were underway. I also want to thank my predecessor, Jr. Warden Van Horn, for his help and specifically wise advice and support.

TREASURER REPORT

“Do you love Me?feed my lambs, tend my sheep, feed my sheep, Follow me.” (John 21:15-17, 19b). How richly blessed we are to be a part of this vibrant and spirit-filled Parish. I personally want to thank each of you for your faithful giving of your time, talents and treasures to the ministry and work of The Church of the Holy Faith.

Our esteemed and well-beloved treasurer (since 2015), Bob Buddendorf and his wife Susan moved from Santa Fe to Dallas in early October 2018. Father Robin asked if I would consider being the treasurer for the church, and I was elected by the Vestry to fill this position at Bob's departure. While I had helped Bob with different aspects of the church accounting for the past four years, there are still many things that I need to learn. I am trying to fill some very big shoes.

We are pleased to report that we are presenting a balanced budget for The Church of the Holy Faith for the 2019 year. The budget was approved by the Vestry at its January 24, 2019, meeting. I am using the same format that Bob used previously in presenting this report to the Parish. The Statement of Activities is divided into two categories: Income and Expenses from Operations and Cash Receipts and Disbursements from Endowment Transactions. In addition, the 2019 Budget is compared with the 2018 Actual Results and the 2018 Budget.

This is the last time that the information will be presented in this format. Beginning in 2019 I am happy to report that we will be using QuickBooks for the church accounting. This has been in the works for the past year or so, and at the suggestion of our independent auditor and our bookkeeper we will be making the transition.

There was net income from Operations in 2018 of \$172,815 compared with a budget of \$19,150. This very favorable budget variance is due to many factors. Our regular contributions, mainly pledges were approximately \$77,000 over budgeted amounts. Approximately \$37,000 of this

difference is due to an increase in prepaid pledges from December 31, 2017 to December 31, 2018. The remainder is attributable to additional parishioner gifts. Our operating expenses were approximately \$44,000 under budget. The majority of this is attributable to the fact that we budgeted for a 3rd clergy position for a portion of 2018, and that position was not filled during 2018. The net operating income was \$153,665 over budget for 2018. We did have significant capital expenditures in 2018. We received \$100,000 from the endowment for capital expenditures and received another \$110,500 from parishioner gifts for a total of \$210,500. We expended \$253,225 for capital expenditures in 2018, using approximately \$32,700 of our net income from operations to fund capital projects. The bottom line for 2018 indicates a surplus of income over expenditures of \$140,090.

The Parish is in a strong financial position at December 31, 2018 with cash in bank accounts of \$524,326 and no debt. In view of the operating results from 2018 and the current cash balance, the vestry is considering endowing a portion of that cash reserve in the newly created Endowed Reserve Fund. The value of the endowment fund at year-end was \$7,023,912, including \$1,078,955 from the Scheffler Fund. The investment return was (7.91%) net of fees for 2018 after having a 16.70% return in 2017. The value of new endowed reserve fund at year-end was \$118,593.

In looking forward to 2019, we are budgeting a net surplus for the year of \$2,545. The most significant assumption made in preparing the 2019 Budget is the Regular Contributions (Pledge Income) which is assumed to be approximately 113% of the current level of 2019 Pledges received to date (as of January 23, 2019). The budgeted amount for 2019 for regular offerings, mainly pledges is close to the actual 2018 revenue as adjusted for the increase in prepaid pledges. We also are budgeting mission and outreach giving from the endowment at 10% (a tithe) of the endowment distribution available for 2019. This amount when added to the other mission and outreach giving totals over \$38,000 for 2019.




REGULAR CONTRIBUTIONS, MAINLY PLEDGES

DEANERY DELEGATES

The Church of the Holy Faith is part of the Northeast Deanery of the Episcopal Diocese of the Rio Grande consisting of the northeastern portion of the State of New Mexico. The deanery meets four times each year for the purpose of sharing information from parishes within the deanery, receiving information from the diocese and preparing for Diocesan Convention, and reviewing grant applications and prioritizing recommendations to the diocesan Poverty & Outreach Board for monetary outlays that come back into the deanery from parochial Fair Share contributions to the diocese. This past year the deanery met at St. James', Taos; Trinity, Los Alamos; Holy Faith, Santa Fe; and St. Bede's, Santa Fe. Deanery delegates also have voice and vote at Diocesan Convention, and in 2018 also participated in the election of the diocesan bishop at the Special Electing Convention in May. Holy Faith's delegates this past year, in addition to the clergy and wardens, were, Marty Buchsbaum (term expires 2019), Charles Chambers and Chris Frenk (terms expire 2020), and Penni Chambers and Ray Wallace (terms expire 2021). Alice McSweeney is an alternate delegate.



PARISH MINISTRY REPORTS

ADULT CHRISTIAN FORMATION

At Holy Faith we are blessed with many opportunities for the study of God's Word, and the writings of authors who excite and enrich our faith as disciples of Christ. Newcomers are always welcome!

SPIRITUAL CLASSICS STUDY GROUP – Every Tuesday at 10 a.m., Father Dodge leads a study of a classic book on Christian spirituality chosen by the group. This past year, the group read and discussed *The Rule of Benedict: A Spirituality for the Twenty-First Century* by Sr. Joan Chittister, *The Rule of Taize*, and C.S. Lewis' *Mere Christianity*. We are just beginning Marilyn Robinson's novel Gilead. New participants are always welcome!

Father Dodge also leads the **MEN'S BIBLE STUDY** every Wednesday at 3 p.m., the **WOMEN'S BIBLE STUDY** every Thursday at 10 a.m. as well as, a co-ed **EVENING BIBLE STUDY** on Mondays at 5:30 p.m. During the past year, we studied the books Genesis, Exodus, and Numbers. For a change of pace, we have shifted back to the New Testament and have just begun the book of Revelation! New participants are always welcome!

The weekly **ADULT FORUMS** are held each Sunday morning at 9:50 a.m. This past year saw a number of different series focusing on adult Christian formation, including several series on spiritual poetry led by parishioner Cissy Lewis and very well received, a series on the Orders of Ministry given by your clergy, different spiritual practices led by Fr. Dodge, as well as a continuing series on Anglican Divines presented by Fr. Gordon. In addition, various parish groups such as the Grief Ministry and the Vestry gave periodic updates about their activities and upcoming offerings. In the coming year, due to popular demand, we are trying to include at least one Sunday for fellowship time each month in place of the Forum. In addition to the Adult Forums continuing in this vein, watch the newsletter and email communications for other learning opportunities, including the Wednesday evening soup suppers in Lent.

CHILDREN'S MINISTRIES

Children's Choir

The Holy Faith Children's Choir is still going strong with 6 youngsters, all under the age of 9. Occasionally, we have visiting singers whom we hope will decide to join us full time as the year progresses. Thanks to a generous donation in honor of our wonderful choir grandmother, Gail Fine, we are now using a curriculum "Celebrating Grace," which is shaped entirely for this age group. It reinforces good singing techniques, plus continuing basic theory, and we sang 2 of the songs from the first unit in church this fall and Christmas. We are using our Orff instruments this spring with the goal to accompany ourselves in church after Easter! As always, our goal is to not only learn about music, but how we can glorify God through song!

Children's Chapel

Volunteers and parents have been faithful Chaplains on Sundays throughout the year. Occasionally only one child will be present to hear the lesson, and sometimes eight or ten children gather in front of the Chapel altar to hear and reflect on the Gospel. Chaplains welcome all who come. The *Weekly Sunday Paper* and other resources are used to help children understand the gospel. The liturgy follows that of the "big church": sign of the cross, the creed,

prayers of the people. At the Peace children walk into church following the Children's Cross, carried by one of the children each Sunday.

Nursery

Maria Sandoval and Veronica Vigil provide a safe and comfortable environment for our youngest church members. They are here for all Sunday services, Tuesday nights for Taizé, Monday nights for Bible study and Wednesday nights for choir rehearsal. Infants and toddlers enjoy the child appropriate environment and the care of these two dedicated child care providers. We also thank our additional volunteer nursery providers, Ann MacVicar, Libby Lokey, Kathryn Schwaar and Thérèse Saint-André. Visitors and Parishioners alike are always amazed to "find" this bright, sunny room at the end of the hall in Conkey House. When a child reaches the age of about three and a half, he or she transitions to Children's Chapel on Sunday mornings.

WOMEN'S SPIRITUALITY

Women's Spirituality is a ministry devoted to providing opportunities for women to experience an ever-deepening relationship with Jesus Christ through study, discussion, and prayer.

The group studies books on spirituality as well as the lives of saints, including Clare of Assisi, Catherine of Siena, Teresa of Avila, Julian of Norwich, Teresa of Calcutta and Francis of Assisi. Since it was founded, more than 340 women from Holy Faith, the Diocese of the Rio Grande, and the community have participated in the classes and retreats organized by the group. During 2018 Women's Spirituality offered the following events and studies:

- The sixth Women's Quiet Day, February 10th, was led by theology professor, Dr. Jean Molesky-Poz, PhD, on "Journey into Lent with St. Clare of Assisi" based on Clare's four letters to the young noblewoman, St. Agnes of Prague. Seventy-three women from the parish, diocese and community attended the all-day event in Palen Hall.
- Following the Women's Quiet Day, Cha Foxhall led six sessions of two groups in Lectio Divina using the text, *Praying with Clair of Assisi*. These sessions were the sixth series of Lectio Divina groups of the Women's Spirituality program with an addition of 24 women.
- In the fall, Deacon Patricia Masterman and Anita Pisa facilitated an eight-week study of Old Testament and New Testament "Women in the Bible." Seventeen women participated in various classes.
- Final planning is in process for the seventh Women's Quiet Day, scheduled for February 23, 2019. The program will be led by Rev. Carolyn Metzler, Episcopal priest and spiritual director of the Albuquerque Center of Action and Contemplation, founded by Richard Rohr, OFM. The theme of this year's program is "Spirituality of Wilderness: A Lenten Journey," where we will look together at the wilderness of our lives and at how God meets us there.

LITURGICAL MINISTRIES

PARISH ADMINISTRATOR AND DIRECTOR OF MUSIC & LITURGY REPORT

We honor our Anglican heritage and praise God with solemn liturgy, traditional Prayer Book worship, and music to exalt the spirit.

As **Parish Administrator**, I work behind the scenes to coordinate the day to day activities of our parish, often times attending meetings of the various ministries and committees to ensure a smooth transition of responsibilities from one committee to another where the needs of one committee's time and talents are required for the activity of another. I work closely with the Rector and Wardens, who act on behalf of the Vestry, to help them fulfill their Canonical responsibility of "keeping in good order, a house of worship and all the necessary furnishings and appointments of the same; providing all things requisite to the carrying on of the work of the Parish." As the Administrator of our parish, handling things both logistically and liturgically, I serve on the Ecumenical Task Force, a committee of the Clergy and lay leadership of the three downtown churches. My main duties in this regard, require scheduling a meeting with our Ecumenical brothers and sisters twice a year in order to plan our three yearly activities, the annual "Pastor's Panel", the Ecumenical Palm Sunday Procession and Liturgy of the Palms on the Plaza, and our Ecumenical Las Posadas. Coordination of these events includes, logistics, planning and permitting with the City of Santa, communicating and scheduling with Southwest Safety to ensure the proper signage and barricades, and communicating and coordinating with the Santa Fe Police department to provide for the safety of all the participants. One of my greatest joys, serving in this position, is working with our Facilities Manager, Marcos Castillo in helping him identify and carry out the ongoing and necessary maintenance of the physical plant, also working with him to ensure proper manual support for the numerous activities of the church, such as opening and closing for all services, set up and cleanup for Sunday forums, Evensong receptions, Weddings and Funerals, Women's Quiet Day retreats, Twice Blessed activities, The St. Nicholas Bazaar, the annual "Greening of the church" and the proper removal of the same in a timely Liturgical manner, only to name a few; the list goes on and on. Donna Lukacs, our Parish Secretary is my greatest lay colleague. She and I work hand in hand, carrying out the daily operations of the church, scheduling and supporting the various meetings and events on our church property. My most sacred privilege, is working with a parishioner in pre-planning their final service in the church, which often includes assisting them in choosing a proper final resting place in our Columbarium, or working with a family in helping them plan a funeral for their loved one.

In preparing for our services, I coordinate and work with:

The Acolytes

It is a joy and privilege to work with our Acolyte Master, Janet McCroskey. Janet works tirelessly, to schedule and assure proper staffing for our various liturgies. She has a special gift when it comes to working with and training our Acolytes, especially training, encouraging and

raising up our youth. She assists me in maintaining and updating all Acolyte Customaries and executing the same. She responds in a timely manner, to the ongoing changes as they occur, to meet the needs of any given liturgy.

The Altar Guild

In response to all of God's mighty acts, we are called to offer ourselves to God's service. The basic motivation for serving in the altar guild – or in any other work of the church – is gratitude. Members of the altar guild are grateful servants: servants of God, servants of God's people, servants of the liturgy, and servants of the worship space. The Altar Guild consists of four teams, led by Shelby Green, Eleanor Ortiz, Dora Horn, and Mary Dale Gordon. Each team commits to one week per month and shares responsibilities in preparing the worship space with the furnishings, appointments, vessels, elements, linens, and paraments used in the liturgy. Whether it is preparing the altar, polishing vessels, removing wax from linens, or pressing vestments, the work is never a burden but is always a privilege. To serve on the Altar Guild is to take the opportunity to serve God in a very intimate and prayerful way.

The Lector Ministry

Our lectors are called to proclaim the "Word of the Lord." This ministry, approximately 40 in number, is scheduled on a quarterly basis and serves at all principle services including Evensongs and other special services of the year as provided for by our Liturgical calendar.

The Usher Ministry

Holy Faith's ushers play a vital role in the smooth orchestration of our worship services each Sunday, and for many other services throughout the year. Ushering is a Ministry of Hospitality that represents the "welcoming Jesus" to guests, visitors and long-time parishioners alike. Ushers are among the first members of The Church of the Holy Faith that you meet when you come to a Sunday service and set the tone for warmth and reverence. Ushers prepare the church for services, discreetly greet parishioners, distribute the service bulletins, take the census, bring the offering of elements to the altar and facilitate collection of the offering. They also seat worshippers during services and assist the disabled who are wheelchair bound or in need of any assistance. They help clear the pews and reset the books used in worship after each service. Ushers serve for one month on a quarterly rotation at the 8:30 a.m. and 11 a.m. services. New ushers are received and trained throughout the year. An organizational meeting is called once a year for the discussion and update of Usher guidelines and procedures and ongoing training as needed.

If you feel you are called to serve on any of these ministries, please feel free to contact me.

As **Director of Music and Liturgy**, I have the privilege of working with our Priests, Lay Ministers, and Choir, in the scheduling, planning, and preparing of all liturgies provided for in The Book of Common Prayer.

One organization that allows me the opportunity to continue to hone my skills as a Liturgist and Church Musician is the Association of Anglican Musicians. Founded in 1966, AAM is the only organization in the Episcopal Church where Clergy and Lay Musicians are in the same room having the same conversation, regarding our rich Anglican heritage. As its mission,

recognizing that the music of the church finds its primary expression within the framework of the liturgy, this Association takes as its purpose the elevation, stimulation, and support of music and the allied arts in all their aspects in the Episcopal Church and the larger Anglican tradition, and especially in their relationship to liturgy. The Association seeks to encourage, through the fellowship of the Association, the sharing of ideas and skills among members, and to endeavor to disseminate the results of this sharing throughout our dioceses, to keep healthy and vibrant our strong musical tradition.

2018 was quite an eventful year for the Diocese of the Rio Grande, with the retirement of one Bishop and the election of another, a Bishop Search Committee, a Transition Committee, a Consecration Planning Committee, not to mention the usual planning of the Annual Diocesan Convention. I mention this because these events of 2018 required specifically the resources of The Church of the Holy Faith, our clergy, our lay leadership, our musicians, and our outstanding volunteers. In October, by invitation of our retiring Bishop Michael Vono, I once again served as Director of Liturgy & Music for the Diocesan Convention and as Organist for the Holy Eucharist held at The Cathedral Church of St. John in Albuquerque, opening the 66th Annual Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of the Rio Grande. While planning for the Diocesan Convention, preparations were simultaneously underway for the Ordination and Consecration of our new Bishop, The Right Reverend Michael Buerkel Hunn, the event in which I had the privilege of serving as the Assisting Master of Ceremonies.

As a Church Musician we are called to be “the mystics of the Liturgy.” It is in our Anglo-Catholic heritage that the church musician assists in bringing the people of God to the place where heaven and earth meet. The Choir, and the music it provides, is an integral part of the Sacramental life of the Church. Renowned English Composer, John Rutter, said in his keynote address during the AAM Winchester Conference held in 2017, that a “church without a choir is like a body without a soul.” The Church of the Holy Faith is blessed to have in its choir a solid base of professional choral musicians. These musicians serve as section leaders, and use their choral talents to assist in fulfilling each and every choir member’s call to the music ministry. Our volunteers equally bring a strong sense of dedication to the choir. Their love and commitment to this ministry inspires us all. In 2018, the Holy Faith Choir carried, a rigorous schedule of 64 rehearsal hours, preparing for 172 services, resulting in approximately 326 performance hours. A particular highlight of the year was having the bittersweet privilege of bidding farewell to our retiring Bishop, The Right Reverend Michael Louis Vono. On the evening of Saturday, September 22, and on behalf of the Northeast Deanery, the clergy, choir, and people of Holy Faith honored Bishop Vono with a Solemn Evensong, followed by a festive reception in Palen Hall.

Our magnificent pipe organ, built by M.P. Möller in 1961, still remains to be one of the great treasures of The Church of the Holy Faith, not to mention being one of the finest installations in New Mexico. Once again, we have contracted with Mountain States Pipe Organ Services, LLC, who provide four regularly scheduled service calls annually to make minor repairs, tune the reeds, and to do such general tuning as may be required by the organist. Great care is

given to the maintenance of the organ, including weekly walkthrough inspections of the pipe chamber.

HOLY FAITH GUILD –

The Holy Faith Guild is an organization of church women whose mission is to provide outreach and funding to non-profit community programs. Guild members meet weekly to make crafts to sell at our annual St Nicholas Bazaar. Funds raised by the bazaar and an endowment that was bequeathed to the Guild by Carol Scheffler are our major funding sources. We use this money to help finance non-profit organizations and other community projects, as voted on by the membership.

This year we celebrated our 136th bazaar on Saturday, December 1. The Twice Blessed preview was held on Friday night. At the preview, attendees were able, for an entrance fee of \$10, to purchase items – only from Twice Blessed – prior to the Saturday bazaar. Saturday we sold crafts made by Guild members as well as food, wreaths and Twice Blessed items donated by parishioners and other supporters. In total, we estimate that we took in \$18,000 this year – a slight decrease over 2017.

We wish to thank the many individuals who helped make this year's bazaar a huge success. Thanks also to our own Fr. Robin and Fr. Jim for their support and blessings, Mark and Donna for getting us into bulletins and e-blasts, and Marcos and Rocio for their help and heavy lifting. Thanks also to the many volunteers, including many, many parishioners, who worked so hard to set up, sell at and dismantle the sale, and to everyone who supported the bazaar by shopping!

Last year we gave out cash donations of approximately \$27,000. Monies from last year's bazaar and endowment were used to support local agencies including: the Food Depot, Interfaith Community Shelter, La Familia, Adelante, Feeding Santa Fe, Inc., Boys & Girls Club, Girls, Inc., Habitat for Humanity, the Youth Shelters and Kitchen Angels, and the Holy Faith mission of Cooking for St Elizabeth's.

Twenty-two women are active members of the Guild. We welcomed two new members this past year, but also sadly lost three due to death and illness. Some of our members cannot attend weekly meetings, but take projects home to work on at their leisure. We welcome and encourage new members who are interested in making items for the bazaar and in sharing

good fellowship, and fun. Special expertise is not required, but always welcome. Come join us any Wednesday from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. and bring a sack lunch – potato chips are provided!

INTERFAITH COMMUNITY SHELTER –

The Interfaith Community Shelter completed a successful year in 2018. Much of the success was due to tremendous participation of the congregation of Holy Faith. The shelter meals program, which included a week in February and a week just completed in December that were hosted by Holy Faith, were well attended and excellent meals were prepared and served for all the guests at the Shelter. Others volunteered in the sleeping area, checking guests into the shelter as well as serving in the closet, storing the guests’ belongings.

The fundraiser, The ChefsCapades, was strongly supported by Holy Faith and the shelter was able to raise over \$100,000 from that event. Also, many members of Holy Faith contribute in other ways – participating in the Sunday lunch program, becoming core volunteers, giving clothing and food to the shelter and generously providing money needed to maintain the

shelter. These contributions are important since our homeless population continues to grow due to a number of factors which include some cuts in services within the state and the increasing rents in a city with less than 1% vacancy rate in housing. The Holy Faith congregation truly lives by the Matthew Imperative, "In as much as you did it to one of the least of these my brethren, you did it to me."

St. Elizabeth's has fewer volunteers to cook during the summer months. One of our volunteers goes to the Food Depot on Wednesdays and buys whatever is available for us to cook. The remainder of the items is purchased at Sam's Club. The dinners consist of a meat, two vegetables, salad and dessert. The volunteers enjoy participating in this important outreach program and we welcome anyone who would like to join our group.

WELCOME MINISTRY –

Sunday greeters who welcome us at the front door (our sister ministry) are the first to meet visitors—vacationers, new Santa Fe residents, seasonal residents, and those who come from other Santa Fe parishes. Often, visitors first come on days other than Sunday, including morning and evening prayer, Wednesday and Thursday noon Masses, the Tuesday evening Taizé Mass, as well as special evensongs and Christmas services. We invite all to eventually make Holy Faith their home parish community. A commitment to membership often begins with completion of one of our pew cards, which prompts welcoming phone calls, emails and personal contacts from the ministry and the rector.

Once each week we maintain the buff-colored pew cards and pencils, and although not strictly a welcoming function, while we are at it, we also take an interest in the prayer books, hymnals and Bibles (books spines must face to the right!). (Hardly worth mentioning, but during 2018, about eight of our pew books seem to have departed, and we have happily replaced them and wish them well in their new homes.)

In 2018 we welcomed 34 new members, a number equivalent to roughly 9% of average Sunday attendance, a new members increase of about 34% over 2017's average. These are just the statistics, but the presence of new friends is a big boost to our community and the vitality of our worship and programs. A welcome to all of you. Please know that you are now special members of our community.

We at Holy Faith would not win a prize as the most outgoing “huggy” church in our city, and just so we don't rest upon strengths of our statistics, we would prompt each of us, including our 2018 new members, to make a renewed effort to reach out to new faces. I remember welcoming a couple, new to me, who (somewhat chidingly) informed me that they had been loyal members for 20 years. I bowed and made a red-faced apology, then we all laughed and became new friends.

Let's not be shy about greeting. (You might even meet an old-timer in the process.)

GRIEF MINISTRY –

This was the seventh year of the Grief Ministry's (GM) service to the parish and to those outside the parish. GM was able to accomplish almost all its goals for this year, mentioned specifically below. One big change has been the retirement of Dr. Camille Barnett, who, along with Janet Schreiber, is one of the founders of GM. Her charisma and leadership skills leave us

with a great challenge to live up to. Randall Hayden and Steven Hecht have volunteered to assume co-leadership for 2019.

Our 2018 activities:

- Recruitment of new workshop facilitators and food preparers
- Official commissioning of the Grief Ministry and its Ministers at Sunday Mass
- Three successful weekend retreats, held in April, September, and December
- A much-appreciated Men's Grief Group, with sessions held weekly over a six-week period in July and August
- Two retablo workshops, led by Juanito Jimenez and Bill Gahr
- Writing To Peace, led by Sr. Paula Gallagher over four weeks in February and March
- Final Affairs, dealing with end-of-life issues, held over three weeks in May
- Retreat reunions for participants of the three weekend retreats
- Follow-up support by facilitators for weekend retreat participants
- A full day training session for new and experienced grief facilitators
- Monthly update and planning meetings for facilitators
- Continued use of the Grief Ministry Resource Center on the second floor of the Conkey Building

We have a dedicated and experienced group of facilitators for 2019, and a major emphasis will be on recruitment to account for inevitable turnover in this group. Recruitment for food preparers is also necessary. It is important to those in need for GM to keep its activity level constant and dependable, for it is an effective way to support parishioners and to introduce the parish to those who otherwise would not have the opportunity. Over the years GM has attracted numerous Santa Feans who end up attending services, providing donations, and even becoming members of the parish.

Feedback from retreat and workshop attendees is quite positive, so we are confident that GM is providing a valuable service to the community. We are grateful that the parish supports us in our task of creating a turning point for people going through their grieving process. The ministry is here to help transform suffering into a positive and soul-nurturing experience.

PARISH LIBRARY –

Our Librarian has been preparing a book repair workshop for small groups of parishioners. Several members of the committee have participated in trial runs using their own books. Virginia has repaired library books as needed and the official parish registers.






