

DUE TO SAFTY MEASURES DURING THE COVID PANDEMIC, THE ANNUAL PARISH MEETING WAS HELD VIA ZOOM

UNOFFICIAL MINUTES

(The minutes are unofficial until they are approved at the 2022 Annual Meeting)

•I. Opening Prayer

Fr. Robin led the members present via ZOOM in prayer.

•II. Call to Order by the Rector

Prior to calling the meeting to order, Fr. Robin remarked on Holy Faith's response to the challenges presented by the pandemic. Conducting the Annual Parish Meeting by ZOOM is one of the measures taken to promote the safety and wellbeing of the congregation. He went on to summarize special rules of order, including rules of election, to effectively and efficiently conduct business by ZOOM. Fr. Robin then called the meeting to order at 4:10 PM.

•III. Approval of the Minutes of the 2019 Annual Meeting

A motion was made and seconded to accept the Minutes of the 2019 Annual Meeting. *Carried unanimously*.

•IV. Vestry Presentation of Nominees

Father Robin recognized the retiring Vestry members: Guy Gronquist, Paul D'Arcy, and Heidi Hahn. Each of the retiring Vestry members will be presented with a lithograph of Holy Faith by artist Grant MacDonald in appreciation of their service to the Parish

The slate of Vestry nominees was presented: Steven Berkshire, Chris Frenk, and Vann Bynum. Fr. Robin called for nominations from the floor and, none being proposed, it was moved and seconded to close nominations. *Carried unanimously*. Acceptance of the three candidates to the Vestry was moved and seconded. *Carried unanimously*.

Alice McSweeney was presented as the nominee for Deanery Delegate. Fr. Robin called for nominations from the floor and, none being proposed, it was moved and seconded to close nominations. *Carried unanimously.* Acceptance of the candidate as Deanery Delegate was moved and seconded. *Carried unanimously.*

•V. Rules of Election and Balloting and the First Ballot - Fr. Robin

Since there were no other nominations and candidates were accepted unanimously, Fr. Robin stated it was not necessary to review the rules of election and balloting.

•VI. Wardens' Reports – Guy Gronquist, Sr. Warden; Paul D'Arcy, Jr. Warden

Guy Gronquist reported on the extraordinary efforts made to maintain Holy Faith as a community of believers during a time when we are isolated from one another. Through the use of live-streaming,

worship services, education ministries, and committee work continues and we pray for the day when we can safely return to in-person meetings. Guy commended the Vestry and Parish leadership on being careful stewards of Holy Faith's resources in these challenging economic times. He thanked the Parish for adopting the Article VII Operations Endowment Fund as well as the members of the congregation who recognized the need for an operations endowment and worked for several years to address it. Guy concluded by updating the Parish on discussions with the Diocese concerning the possible sale of Camp Stoney. It was believed that the property, gifted by Holy Faith to the Diocese in the 1963, would revert to Holy Faith in the event Camp Stoney would no longer be used for religious or educational purposes. Archival research revealed that a previous Vestry of Holy Faith approved a resolution in 1987 formally relinquishing any claims on the gift of Camp Stoney made to the Diocese. The current Vestry affirmed the resolution adopted in 1987.

Paul D'Arcy reviewed the many projects undertaken in 2020 to improve and maintain the Parish property. Special mention was made of the renovation of the chapel sacristy, modernization of the audio/visual system, repointing the mortar of the Sanctuary, and creation of a walkway in the Memorial Garden. Paul thanked the parishioners, staff, and contractors for their commitment and dedication to accomplishing the work done in 2020.

•VII. Financial Reports – Steven Berkshire, Treasurer

- (a)Steven began by thanking the Parish for their financial commitment during uncertain times. The Parish ended 2020 with a surplus of \$46,883. Staff and Vestry efforts to vigilantly control expenses, as well as the generosity of the congregation, resulted in the Parish ending the year in a sound financial position.
- (b)Steven presented a draft 2021 budget. Highlights include a modest decline in offerings and expenses compared to actual 2020 offerings and expenses, leaving a year-end surplus of \$58,797. The proposed budget anticipates continued restrictions due to the pandemic but if the situation changes, the budget can be revisited and revised as necessary.

•<u>VIII. Parish Reports – Father Dodge</u>

Fr. Robin encouraged attendees to the meeting to read and review the various reports presented in the Annual Report.

•IX. The Rector's Charge to the Parish – Father Dodge

Fr. Robin reported that 2020 began normally enough but then the pandemic changed everything. What was anticipated to be a short-term disruption became a long-term challenge. Holy Faith responded quickly by embracing live-streaming capabilities. The efforts of Mark Childers, Donna Lukas, and Ken Duran were invaluable in implementing and improving an on-line experience. Morning Prayer and Evening Prayer continued through ZOOM and thrived due to the work of Guy Gronquist reaching more than 5,000 online participants.

Evening Bible Study, Men's Bible Study, Women's Bible Study, and the Spiritual Classics all experienced increased participation on ZOOM. Committees continued to meet online. These and other groups have contributed to maintaining and strengthening community. Fr. Jim Gordon has continued efforts, along with Faith Family and Faith Friends, to ensure that pastoral needs are met. Children's ministries, under the guidance of Janet McCroskey and Kathlene Ritch, have successfully transitioned online.

Holy Faith's commitment to the community has continued uninterrupted meeting the challenge of social distancing with innovation and flexibility. Volunteers serve with numerous service organizations,

especially the Interfaith Community Shelter. The 137th annual St. Nicholas Bazaar faced the task of social distancing by undertaking a virtual event in 2020.

The Vestry worked tirelessly during the year to ensure that Holy Faith would thrive in the face of the pandemic. Retiring Vestry members Guy Gronquist, Paul D'Arcy, and Heidi Hahn along with Charles Chambers, Dan Green, Leslea McCabe, Walter Sterling, Van Swift, and Charles Rountree worked diligently to support and encourage Holy Faith. Remaining Vestry members, along with Fr. Robin, welcomed new members Steven Berkshire, Vann Bynum, and Chris Frenk to the 2021 Vestry.

The Parish welcomed Mtr. Madelynn Johnson as Assisting Priest while sadly saying goodbye to the retiring Mtr. Pam Graham and the late Fr. Richard Murphy. In memory of Fr. Murphy and in honor of his service, the Vestry has designated the newly-renovated chapel sacristy to the Glory of God and in Thanksgiving for the Ministry of the Rev'd Dr. Richard Murphy.

The determination of parishioners, the commitment of the Vestry, and the efforts of the clergy and staff show that Holy Faith is well poised to face whatever 2021 will bring. The Parish cannot, however, return to in-person activities until the infection rate and positive test rate for COVID comes down. To accomplish this, the Rector charges the Parish of Holy Faith:

*Register and get vaccinated for the coronavirus

Check on your fellow parishioners, reach out to those you miss seeing, contact those you know

are alone and if you need anything, know that Holy Faith is here for you

*When it is safe to return, com home to Holy Faith with your love, your enthusiasm, and your

energy so that Holy Faith continues to be a place to worship the Lord, where the presence of

the Holy Spirit is palpable, and where we receive the love of Christ!

******Keep your faith and keep Holy Faith in your prayers.*

RULES FOR THE ELECTION OF PERSONS TO THE VESTRY AND AS DEANERY/DIOCESAN DELEGATES

RESOLVED – The rules for the election of persons to the Vestry and as Convention Delegate will be as follows:

- 1. All votes cast shall be on ballots furnished by the Church.
- 2. Each ballot must show votes for the exact number of persons specified for that ballot, or that ballot will be considered invalid and shall not be counted.
- 3. Prayer shall precede each ballot.
- 4. The procedure for counting the ballots is:
 - a) The retiring Vestry members will count the ballot. One of the counters will serve as teller and will call out the vote on each ballot. The remaining two counters will each record the votes.
 - b) The teller reads the ballot; the counters simultaneously record the count. Each candidate's name is marked on each counter's list as the names are read out.
 - c) The counters' totals are tallied producing the top 3 vote getters.
- 5. The Teller shall report to the Rector, in writing, after each ballot has been counted and verified, providing the following information.
 - a) The total number of valid ballots cast.
 - b) The number needed for election, being a majority of the number of valid ballots cast.
 - c) The total number of votes received by each nominee.
- 6. The Rector shall declare as elected any nominee who has received a majority of the number of valid ballots cast.
- 7. The Rector shall not announce the vote total of any nominee at any time, nor shall the Teller, unless this ruling is overturned by a two/thirds majority of eligible members present.
- 8. On each succeeding ballot, the candidate with the lowest total of votes shall be dropped from the ballot until all new places have been filled. This entire procedure will apply to both Vestry and Delegate positions.

Associate Rector Report The Reverend Jim Gordon

Lay Pastoral Visitors

In the later part of the year, as the church began to resemble its former pre-COVID-19 self, the Lay Pastoral Visitors team also began to do so. That meant reaching out to parishioners who are temporarily or permanently homebound. Many of the Visitors are authorized to take Communion to the homebound as well to supplement the visits of the Parish Clergy. Faithful Communion bearers who were part of this joyful ministry in 2021 include Alice McSweeney, Ed Colson, Charles Chambers, Allyson Adams, Pam Jones and Nike Kern.

Morning, Evening Prayer Presiders

In-person Morning and Evening Prayer, which had switched to a Zoom format because of the pandemic, returned. Among those leading prayer to augment clergy efforts were Penni and Charles Chambers, Jack and Molly Lott, Marty Buchsbaum, Ed Colson, Steven Hecht, Bunny Huffman, Marcus Parker and Kent and Kaki Grubbs.

Sunday Forums

In the midst of the pandemic, Sunday Forums also changed to a Zoom format and were presented once or twice monthly. When Palen Hall opened between Sunday services at the start of the new church year on Nov. 28, the gatherings were limited to (much-missed) and much-needed) fellowship. But Christian-education forums were set to restart in January 2022 with a series of presentations by Fr. Robin. In coming months expect to see Forums by Deacon Lynn Finnegan as well as former presenters Cissy Lewis, the Rev. Eric Springsted, and Fr. Jim Gordon.

Sunday Breakfasts

Sunday Breakfasts became another COVID-19 casualty. For several years, the Free Spirits had put on breakfasts for the congregation. Rebecca Tobey led the group, ably assisted by Ruth Rael and Jacki Walker and helped by Sue Angel, Elaine Coleman, Betty Lou Dent, Terese Fayden, Patty Griego, Sue Kropschot, Gary Moran, Ann MacVicar, Linda Morsman, Van Swift, Kay Swindell, Jody Register, Pat Stanley and Sylvia Johnson. In 2019, the men's group also began providing breakfasts. The breakfasts will have a rebirth in 2022, beginning March 5 with a meal provided by the Free Spirits.

Faith Family

The purpose of this ministry, established by Fr. Jim and parishioner Steven Hecht, is to provide assistance for parishioners with time-limited needs due to an injury or a post-operative situation who have inadequate local help from family, friends, or neighbors. In the ministry's brief life, a wide range of services have been offered including driving to church and appointments, picking up groceries, making phone calls, etc.

The pandemic greatly affected this ministry, but late in 2021 it received a new birth and a new approach brought by Deacon Lynn Finnegan, working under Fr. Jim's oversight. For more information about Faith Family, see Deacon Lynn's report on Page 13.

Deacon's Report The Rev. Deacon Lynn Finnegan

Ordained on Juneteenth, 2021 to the transitional diaconate, I was assigned by Bishop Hunn to serve at The Church of the Holy Faith and joined this wonderful church family in August. My first task was to try to remember the names and (masked) faces of friendly parishioners who enthusiastically welcomed me on the church steps. Thank you, Holy Faith parishioners, for your warm welcome and please forgive me if I still can't remember your name (I'm getting there).

<u>Worship</u>

One of the roles of a deacon is to assist the priest in public worship. While I have a background in both Rite I and Rite II liturgies, the second order of business was to learn "all things Holy Faith" as I served as deacon in a variety of worship services. Gratitude goes to Fr. Robin, Fr. Jim, and Mark Childers for their patient (and thorough!) instruction. The liturgical ministry of a deacon is a ministry of service, primarily proclamation and preparation; thus, the deacon traditionally proclaims the gospel, leads the prayers of the people, and sets the table for the Eucharist. At Holy Faith, I have also been given the privilege of sharing the pulpit. Finally, the deacon sends the congregation out into the world - "go forth in the name of Christ" - to be the hands and feet of Jesus. This might be my favorite part of a worship service, when I can joyfully send you all out to love and serve the Lord.

Faith Family

With Fr. Jim's help, I was able to coordinate a reinvigorated "Faith Family," a pastoral care ministry formed five years ago. The pandemic awakened a growing need to reach out, strengthen relationships, and provide a safe and loving resource for rides, meals, cards, visits and support for our fellowship of believers. An all-day training for volunteers was held in November, where we discussed pastoral care with an emphasis on scripture, and shared stories and practical tips. The volunteers were commissioned the First Sunday of Advent and the ministry began in December. A team of "Faith Family lead disciples" rotates as the point of contact for the parish each month. Thank you to Ed Colson, Pam Jones, Alice McSweeney, Bonnie Hardwick, Mari Russell, Rhonda Black, Sally Ritch and Judy White, our lead disciples. A large team of support disciples have also stepped forward to provide assistance. My gratitude goes out to Barry Baltzley, Christine Bynum, Bill and Barbara Dedmon, Elaine Gere, Dan Green, Bonnie Hardwick, Nike Kern, Margaret Hubby, Frank and Leslea McCabe, Simon Mostert, Carol Murphy, Kathleen Orozco, Anita Pisa, Charlotte and Tom Rundell, Van Swift, and Toni Weiser.

Outreach and Pastoral Care

A traditional role of the deacon is to be a "bridge" between the congregation and the needs of the community. I have had an opportunity to help and provide a pastoral presence with Holy Faith's ministry at the Interfaith Community Shelter, to meet and help the enthusiastic "Feed the Hungry" ministry team, and to serve on the Mission and Outreach Committee. Working with Lutheran Family Services and the Diocese of the Rio Grande, I worked to encourage support for Afghan refugees. Thanks to Anita Pisa and Brenda Shears who attended the LFS online training, and to Marcus Parker and Margaret Hubby for expressing an interest in helping. This ministry is ongoing.

Finally, I am taking a course entitled "Pastoral Care Toolbox" through the Thriving in Bivocational Ministry program at the Seminary of the Southwest. Part of the course's objective is to share pastoral care knowledge and tools with a member of the laity. Thank you to Rhonda Black, who has been my enthusiastic co-student in this course.

CHILDREN'S MINISTRIES

The steadfast volunteers of the Children's ministry did not let the lingering Covid concerns stop them from continuing to reveal Christ's message to the children and youth of Holy Faith. Our youngest children continued to be engaged in the rhythm and stories of the Lectionary through the personally delivered crafts and lessons packets distributed through the year. They continued to gather for 'Zoom Chapel' which cemented the on-going personal relationships between the kids and the adult volunteers. Our older youth consistently gathered via Zoom to complete a book study from the *Chronicles of Narnia* and were a supportive group for each other as they met and socialized online.

As Covid restrictions eased, the All-Parish Picnic was held at Camp Stoney and well-attended by many families, eager for a chance to see each other in person! Much frivolity and laughter ensued as the kids played games and ran around (as kids do), while adults were able to socialize and relax and enjoy good food.

In October, our children participated in the much-anticipated and then wildly successful 'Trunk or Treat'. Thank you to all adult parishioners who took the time to decorate their cars and hand out treats to the kids. It was a delight to see the families come together, catch up with each other and form relationships amongst themselves while the children proudly displayed their creative costumes to all in attendance.

As the church reopened more fully for all activities during the 4th quarter of the year, inperson Children's Chapel resumed with a much larger attendance than before, thanks, in part, to the relationships formed and maintained with on-line Zoom chapel. It's great to see the kids proudly process into the church on Sundays to the smiles and singing of "Jesus Loves Me" from their parish family.

And who isn't proud and delighted that we have 23 children in the Christmas Pageant this year, including some new families! Holy Faith Children's Ministry is alive and well and growing. From the youngest in Children's Chapel to the youth serving at the altar as acolytes, our children's programs are continuing to feed the souls of the kids and adults involved. <u>Nursery</u>

Joyfully, our nursery reopened with the resumption of Children's Chapel at the beginning of Advent after having been closed since April 2020. Staffed by Rocio Salazar and Anahi Castillo, the nursery provides a safe and comfortable environment for our youngest church members for the 8:30 and 11:00 Sunday services, Tuesday nights for Taizé, and other special services as announced.

SENIOR WARDEN REPORT

This past year has been filled with many changes in the life of the church. Fortunately, most of the changes have been positive. The ability to worship together has allowed the congregation to again participate in community with one another and the further opening of most of the programs and ministries of Holy Faith has been a blessing to us.

For example, Women's Spirituality, led by Mother Madelynn, was one of the first programs opened in person. This program studied Women in the Old Testament and, in the fall, Women in the New Testament. Both these programs were enthusiastically received by many Women of Holy Faith and helped in deepening their spiritual life. One of the books that was studied, *Women In The New Testament*, by Bonnie Thurston, a well-known theologian, led to the invitation to speak at Holy Faith as part of the Scheffler lectures in June of 2022.

Some programs that reopened like Women's Bible Study have such a dedicated group that it is sometimes difficult to find a seat.

Also, the Women's Guild, through hard work, ingenuity and innovation received as much money for programs as in past years that were "normal". This allowed the Guild to help the nonprofits in Santa Fe that are involved in helping those less fortunate in many categories.

This fall, Faith Family ministry was re-launched and retrained by Deacon Lynn and many more parishioners are participating in the program than in the past.

All of our core ministries are back and running and the Children's program through Zoom and other innovative programs have been unusually successful. This work has paid off with the increased participation of many new children in the program. For example, the Christmas Pageant was larger than any time in the last 10 years and so successful that a few children visiting the church ran up to also participate. The picture of the Christmas Pageant appeared in color on the front page of Santa Fe New Mexican newspaper with a lengthy article about the program. It was very exciting.

Having worked with the Diocese about reopening, the only remaining indication of COVID times is the contact tracing and masks. Most of all, we have learned new ways of doing many things so that we are able to keep us together in community regardless of the circumstances. I believe this will allow us to grow as a church.

I am pleased to have served as Senior Warden for Holy Faith for 2021. Under the leadership of the Rector, the Vestry and the Senior staff, I believe that we have had a successful year, working together to get us in full force, developing new skills for the future.

TREASURER REPORT

Many thanks to the members of the Parish for their gracious commitment and support to the ongoing mission and outreach of The Church of the Holy Faith. Members of the Parish exceeded their 2021 pledge commitment by almost 6% over 2020. This is amazing considering the ongoing restrictions experienced by everyone because of COVID-19. Prepaid pledges paid in 2020 for 2021 exceeded the prepaid pledges made for 2020; and prepaid pledges for 2022 received in 2021 exceeded 2021 prepaid pledges by 4.3%. For 2021 the Church received 205 pledges totaling \$844,984. For 2022, as of January 5, 2022, 180 pledges had been made totaling \$895,971. Participation in making a pledge is a little more than 50% of the Parish. Members of The Church of the Holy Faith actually gave more than \$1 Million, a very good sign.

Total operating income for 2021 was \$1,216,163 which includes gifts, rental income and other contributions and gifts. Total operating expenses, those expenses related to the daily operations of the Parish, were \$1,012,124, leaving a positive balance of \$204,039. The Church of the Holy Faith also does extensive mission and outreach, education, library and programming, both for the Parish and for the Community. The Church accounts for these as other income and expenses. They are primarily funded through gifts and proceeds from the Endowment. Capital expenses also are funded by the Endowment. In 2021 there were \$359,135 in expenses related to the mission of the Church in the community. Of this \$264,151 were capital expenses. Thirty-one percent of overall resources went to these outreach opportunities. Another positive

for the members of Holy Faith. The net income for 2021 when factoring in both the operating expenses and income and the other income and expenses was a positive \$209,975. The Church of the Holy Faith has a healthy financial future in serving the spiritual needs of Santa Fe.

The Church applied for, and was subsequently forgiven, in 2020 the Payroll Protection Program (PPP) through the Small Business Administration. The Church received \$112,790 through the PPP program. The loan was initially listed as a liability on the Balance Sheet and, when forgiven in 2021, moved to designated income on the 2021 Profit and Loss Statement. The Church also applied for and received a second PPP loan in 2021 in the amount of \$131,255, which is also listed as a liability on the Balance Sheet. Once it is forgiven it will then be moved to designated income on the 2022 Profit and Loss statement. The loans contributed significantly to the cash flow for the Church in 2021.

The Church has two Endowment funds held by Northern Trust. The funds invested are monitored by the Church's Investment Committee chaired by Peter Lockyer. This committee meets quarterly with the investment managers from Northern Trust. The Church of the Holy Faith Endowment had a market value of \$10,033,864 on December 31, 2021. The Church of the Holy Faith Operations Endowment Fund had a market value of \$511,575 on December 31, 2021. Combined the market value on December 31, 2021, was \$10,545,439. The Endowment includes subaccounts for capital, Library education, Guild, Mission and Outreach, while the Operations Endowment Fund may also be used for operational expenses.

Finances are monitored by the Finance Committee which meets monthly prior to Vestry. The committee reviews monthly financial statements, reviews and recommends to the Vestry expenditures that may be outside the budget, reviews, reviews the Investment Committee actions, and recommends the annual budget to the Vestry.

The annual audit for 2020 was completed by the accounting firm of Swain and Grieco, LLC. The Church is required to have an annual audit conducted by an outside firm. The 2020 audit is available in the Church Office for anyone to review. The audit letter did not identify any discrepancies or deficiencies and provided a positive review of the Parish finances and its financial condition. The audit once approved by the Vestry is submitted to the Diocese for its review and acceptance.

The Church of the Holy Faith is responsible for providing its fair share to the Diocese to support the programs of the Diocese of the Rio Grande. In 2021 Holy Faith contributed \$164,791 as its fair share.

The 2022 Budget has been approved by the Vestry and is attached to this report. The report shows a comparison to the 2021 budget, actual 2021 expenses and the 2022 budget as approved.

The 2022 Budget anticipates an increase in pledge giving from 2021. With return to in person services and activities the Vestry believes this is doable. Total operating income is anticipated to be \$1,089,972 and total operating expenses are anticipated to be \$1,079,180 providing a net ordinary income from operations of the Church of \$10,792.00. As noted elsewhere in this report the Parish also participates in a great deal of community outreach and support for the Parish. These amounts are typically funded by gifts and donations as well as transfers from the Endowment which cover the expenses. The amount available from the Endowment is dependent on the three-year rolling average from earning which is calculated once the Church receives the final 2021 statements from Northern Trust. The Church has a healthy cash balance going into 2022.

ST. FRANCIS LEGACY SOCIETY

The St. Francis Legacy Society Committee is pleased to report that 42 members of the Parish have furnished Statement of Intent forms or other indications of including The Church of the Holy Faith in their estate plans. Questions may be referred to Sandra Brinck, Chair of the committee, or the Holy Faith Treasurer. There is usually an annual gathering of the Society, which did not occur in 2021 because of the pandemic but will resume when conditions allow, and members are recognized by the presentation of a lapel pin of our St. Francis statue.

DEANERY DELEGATES

The Church of the Holy Faith is part of the Northeast Deanery of the Episcopal Diocese of the Rio Grande consisting of the northeastern portion of the State of New Mexico. The deanery meets four times each year for the purpose of sharing information from parishes within the deanery and receiving information from the diocese and preparing for Diocesan Convention. This past year the deanery met via Zoom for the other three meetings. Deanery delegates also have voice and vote at Diocesan Convention. Holy Faith's delegates this past year, in addition to the clergy and wardens were Marty Buchsbaum (term expires 2022), Charles Chambers and Chris Frenk (terms expire 2023), and Alice McSweeney (term expires 2024).

PARISH MINISTRY REPORTS

ADULT CHRISTIAN FORMATION

At Holy Faith we are blessed with many opportunities for the study of God's Word, and the writings of authors who excite and enrich our faith as disciples of Christ. During the beginning of the pandemic, these opportunities were presented via Zoom. Since June 2021, they have resumed in person. New participants are always welcome!

SPIRITUAL CLASSICS STUDY GROUP – Every Tuesday at 10:00 a.m., Father Dodge leads a study of a classic book on Christian spirituality chosen by the group. This past year, the group read and discussed *The Call* by Os Guinness, and John Bunyan's *The Pilgrim's Progress*. We are currently beginning Howard Thurman's *Jesus and the Disinherited*. New participants are always welcome!

Father Dodge also leads the **MEN'S BIBLE STUDY** every Wednesday at 3 p.m., the **WOMEN'S BIBLE STUDY** every Thursday at 10 a.m. as well as, a co-ed **EVENING BIBLE STUDY** on Mondays at 5:30 p.m. During the past year, we studied, appropriate for the season of pandemic, the Psalms, and the Epistle to the Hebrews. We are now reading Ecclesiastes. New participants are always welcome!

The weekly **ADULT FORUMS** are usually held each Sunday morning at 9:50 a.m. They were suspended because of COVID, but during the past year Fr. Gordon endeavored to provide forums at least one Sunday a month via Zoom. The forums resumed in-person this January, with Fr. Dodge leading a "Welcome Back to Basics" series as a kind of Inquirers' Class for people new to the faith, new to The Episcopal Church, new to Holy Faith, or who just want a refresher.

WOMEN'S SPIRITUALITY

2021 was an exciting year for the Women's Spirituality program. Under the leadership of Mtr. Madelynn, this ministry studied Women in the Old Testament and later this past year, Women in the New Testament. Both programs were enthusiastically received. In fact, the book used for the study by the noted theologian, Bonnie Thurston, resulted in an invitation by Fr. Robin to the author of the book to come to the Scheffler lecture in May, 2022. New programs are in process for the coming year. The first program will be based on the book, *The Praying Life* by Deborah Douglas beginning on February 3, 2022.

ATTRIBUTES OF THE HOLY SPIRIT AND THE INDWELLING OF THE HOLY SPIRIT

This class began August 2, 2021 and lasted 15 weeks until November 15, 2021 with 8 members. We met in the Campbell Room every Monday from 11 a.m. until 12:30 p.m. We watched Rick Renner's DVDs and discussed what we had learned and answered any questions that followed.

EDUCATION FOR MINISTRY

Education for Ministry (EfM) started at Holy Faith in September 2021. EfM is a program offered through the School of Theology at the University of the South (Sewanee). For this first group at Holy Faith there are five members of the Parish participating, led by EfM mentor Steven Berkshire. The group meets weekly to participate in discussions surrounding the Old and New Testament, Church and Christian history, and exploring one's faith and spirituality. Since all the participants are in the first year of the four year series, they are exploring the Old Testament, its history, context, and meaning. In the second year the group will explore the New Testament, year three Christian and Church history and finally in the fourth year, faith and spirituality. The group also explores doing theological reflection each week. Registration for the 2022-23 year will happen summer 2022.

LITURGICAL MINISTRIES

PARISH ADMINISTRATOR AND

DIRECTOR OF LITURGY & MUSIC REPORT

We honor our Anglican heritage and praise God with solemn liturgy, traditional Prayer Book worship, and music to exalt the spirit.

As Parish Administrator, I work behind the scenes to coordinate the day to day activities of our parish, often times attending meetings of the various ministries and committees to ensure a smooth transition of responsibilities from one committee to another where the needs of one committee's time and talents are required for the activity of another. I work closely with the Rector and Wardens, who act on behalf of the Vestry, to help them fulfill their Canonical responsibility of "keeping in good order, a house of worship and all the necessary furnishings and appointments of the same; providing all things requisite to the carrying on of the work of the Parish."

While parish life has been far from normal, our ability to "be church" has continued despite a pandemic. Through the use of technology, we have been able to bring the celebration of the Holy Eucharist, Evensong, and other special services to not only our own parish family, but to others throughout the country, and sometimes even from across the pond. This transition into online services did not happen without some trial and tribulation. But we did it!

As Director of Music and Liturgy, I have the privilege of working with our Priests, Lay Ministers, and Choir, in the scheduling, planning, and preparing of all liturgies provided for in The Book of Common Prayer.

In preparing for our services, I coordinate and work with:

The Acolytes – It is a joy and privilege to work with our Acolyte Master, Janet McCroskey. Janet works tirelessly to schedule and assure proper staffing for our various liturgies. She has a special gift when it comes to working with and training our Acolytes, especially training, encouraging and raising up our youth. She assists me in maintaining and updating all Acolyte Customaries and executing the same. She responds in a timely manner, to the ongoing changes as they occur, to meet the needs of any given liturgy.

The Altar Guild – In response to all of God's mighty acts, we are called to offer ourselves to God's service. The basic motivation for serving in the altar guild – or in any other work of the church – is gratitude. Members of the altar guild are grateful servants: servants of God, servants of God's people, servants of the liturgy, and servants of the worship space. Whether it is preparing the altar, polishing vessels, removing wax from linens, or pressing vestments, the work is never a burden but is always a privilege. To serve on the Altar Guild is to take the opportunity to serve God in a very intimate and prayerful way. We are very much in need of more volunteers to serve on the Altar Guild.

The Lector Ministry – Our lectors are called to proclaim the "Word of the Lord." This ministry serves at all principle services and other special services of the year as provided for by our Liturgical calendar.

The Usher Ministry – Holy Faith's ushers play a vital role in the smooth orchestration of our worship services each Sunday, and for many other services throughout the year. Ushering is a Ministry of Hospitality that represents the "welcoming Jesus" to guests, visitors and long-time parishioners alike. Ushers are among the first members of The Church of the Holy Faith that you meet when you come to a Sunday service and set the tone for warmth and reverence. Ushers prepare the church for services, discreetly greet parishioners, distribute the service bulletins, take the census, bring the offering of elements to the altar, and facilitate collection of the offering. They also seat worshippers during services and assist the disabled who are wheelchair bound or in need of any assistance. They help clear the pews and reset the books used in worship after each service. New ushers are received and trained throughout the year.

The Choir – As Church Musicians we are called to be "the mystics of the Liturgy." It is in our Anglo-Catholic heritage that the church musician assists in bringing the people of God to the place where heaven and earth meet. The Choir, and the music it provides, is an integral part of the Sacramental life of the Church. Renowned English Composer, John Rutter, said in his keynote address during the AAM Winchester Conference held in 2017, that a "church without a choir is like a body without a soul." The Church of the Holy Faith is blessed to have in its choir a solid base of professional choral musicians. These musicians serve as section leaders and use their choral talents to assist in fulfilling each and every chorister's call to the music ministry.

Our choir is undoubtedly the one ministry that has been most impacted by the pandemic. Like all church choirs, professional choral ensembles, opera companies, and any other performing arts organization where, gathering in a group and singing is the norm, coming together as a community in this particular ministry is simply not possible at this time. We have found a way to social distance at least eight of our section leaders. Like all of you, I miss our full choir terribly, but I look forward to the day that we can hear the fullness of their voices once again.

Our magnificent pipe organ, built by M.P. Möller in 1961, still remains to be one of the great treasures of The Church of the Holy Faith, not to mention being one of the finest installations in New Mexico, and great care is given to its maintenance. Once again, we have contracted with Mountain States Pipe Organ Services, LLC, who provide four regularly scheduled service calls annually to make minor repairs, tune the reeds, and to do such general tuning as may be required. After almost twenty years, re-leathering of the bellows, the lungs of the organ, was needed. This project was scheduled to be completed in the 2020 fiscal year, however because of the pandemic, availability and travel for our technician was limited. This work was completed in early 2021 at a cost of approximately \$6,000.00.

Through patience and perseverance and by the grace of God we have prevailed. We have not been silenced by a pandemic nor have we allowed it to become our icon. Jesus Christ is our icon, the same yesterday, today, and forever. The Word of the Lord is proclaimed, the Gospel is preached, Holy Eucharist is celebrated, the voices sing, and God is glorified!

INTERFAITH COMMUNITY SHELTER -

2021 saw the Interfaith Community Shelter (Pete's Place) keep the doors open and serve the community despite the ongoing challenges presented by the Covid-19 pandemic. Guests were strictly monitored for the virus, and Healthcare for the Homeless provided Covid testing and vaccinations for all, including staff members. Hot meals are again being served during the weekdays as well as the evenings. Holy Faith's participation in Sunday hot meals at lunchtime continues as well.

The Board of the Shelter worked through staffing changes, most notably the sudden death of former Executive Director and interim Director Joe Berenis-Jordan. During the summer and continuing into the fall, the Board interviewed and ultimately hired a new Executive Director, Korina Lopez to take the helm and begin leading the shelter in new directions.

The focus of Pete's Place continues to be the ongoing attempt to find permanent housing for our guests. To that end, ED Lopez and the Board are working with the City to implement a new plan for utilizing other available spaces in Santa Fe besides the Shelter for housing those in our community experiencing homelessness.

Holy Faith's support of the mission and ministry of Pete's Place is ongoing and faithful. Our members lovingly provided a weeks' worth of home-cooked meals for the guests, and our volunteers staffed the kitchen at the shelter for Holy Faith's scheduled work week. In fact, our volunteer kitchen team served more meals at more times than our scheduled week, as Shelter staff called on us for help serving and Holy Faith answered the call.

Financial donations continue to be received from Holy Faith congregants and are gratefully utilized. The need continues, however. With the advent of new programs to serve the needy comes the necessity for proper budgeting and additional fund raising for those efforts. To those who serve from Holy Faith, to those who give from Holy Faith – thank you. Your participation is needed and warmly welcomed. She presented "The Greatest Gift I Ever Received: A journey from old European holiday traditions to meeting the babe of Christmas. New meaning to an old holiday".

Our on-going service project continues to be our Layette Ministry. Baby items are purchased and delivered to hospitals for young mothers in need. 
