

UNOFFICIAL MINUTES

•I. Opening Hymn and Prayer

After the opening hymn, *The Church's One Foundation*, Father Robin led the members present in prayer.

•II. Call to Order by the Rector

Fr. Robin then called the meeting to order at 4:10 PM.

•III. Approval of the Minutes of the 2021 Annual Meeting

A motion was made and seconded to accept the Minutes of the 2021 Annual Meeting. *Carried unanimously*.

•<u>IV. Vestry Presentation of Nominees</u>

Father Robin recognized the retiring Vestry members: Leslea McCabe, Dan Green, and Charles Rountree. Each of the retiring Vestry members was presented with a lithograph of Holy Faith by artist Grant MacDonald in appreciation of their service to the Parish.

The slate of Vestry nominees was presented: Ruth Rael, Mark Everett, and Peter Lockyer. Fr. Robin called for nominations from the floor and, none being proposed, a motion was made and seconded to close nominations. *Carried unanimously*. Acceptance of the three candidates to the Vestry was moved and seconded. *Carried unanimously*.

Marty Buchsbaum was presented as the nominee for Deanery Delegate. Fr. Robin called for nominations from the floor and, none being proposed, a motion was made and seconded to close nominations. *Carried unanimously.* Acceptance of the candidate as Deanery Delegate was made and seconded. *Carried unanimously.*

•V. Rules of Election and Balloting and the First Ballot – Fr. Robin

Since there were no other nominations and candidates were accepted unanimously, Fr. Robin stated it was not necessary to review the rules of election and balloting.

• VI. Wardens' Reports – Van Swift, Sr. Warden; Dan Green, Jr. Warden

Van Swift, Senior Warden, reported that Holy Faith has responded to the challenges of the past year with innovation and flexibility. The parish has successfully reopened for worship and programs. The Children's Ministry has been particularly successful taking advantage of ZOOM gatherings: the results have been increased participation in children's programs including 'Trunk or Treat' and the Christmas Pageant. Women's Spirituality, ably led by Mtr. Madelynn, has also completed a successful year. It was one of the first programs to begin in-person gatherings with both a Spring and Fall program.

Van made special mention of the Women's Guild: they once again have 'risen to the occasion' with hard work and ingenuity to continue robust fundraising supporting local non-profits. Van went on to acknowledge that Holy Faith is a special place that draws where parishioners often remark that they've 'found a home'. She ended by saying she was pleased and honored to serve as Senior Warden.

Dan Green, Junior Warden, reviewed projects undertaken and completed in 2021. Special mention was made of the work next to the nave in the Memorial Garden to stabilize the foundation, audio/visual equipment placed in service to enhance online streaming broadcasts, installation of glass doors in the hallway of Palen Hall, and the work Sarah McCarty accomplished in replanting the Memorial Garden. Dan noted that of the \$271K allocated for maintenance and improvements, expenses for the completed projects in 2021 totaled \$265K. He concluded by thanking the Vestry, Fr Robin, and Mark Childers for their support and guidance.

•<u>VII. Financial Reports – Steven Berkshire, Treasurer</u>

- (a)Steven began by noting that despite challenges, Holy Faith remains solid financially. The Parish ended 2021 with an operating surplus of \$204K. An audit of the 2020 financial statements, conducted by Swain & Greico, reported a positive review of Parish finances and accounting practices. A copy of the audit is available in the church office for anyone to review. Staff and Vestry efforts to monitor expenses, as well as the generosity of the congregation, resulted in the Parish ending the year in a sound financial position.
- (b)Steven presented the 2022 budget as approved by the Vestry. Highlights include an increase in expenses compared to actual 2021 reflecting a return to in-person worship and programs, leaving a year-end operating surplus of \$10K.

•<u>VIII. Parish Reports – Father Dodge</u>

Fr. Robin encouraged attendees to the meeting to read and review the various reports presented in the Annual Report.

•IX. The Rector's Charge to the Parish – Father Dodge

Fr. Robin began by repeating his opening remarks from last year's annual meeting: what a year the past year has been! Although we anticipated returning to a new sort of 'normal' in 2022, God had other plans for us. Despite the challenges, the Church of the Holy Faith has remained faithful to where God is leading us and we remain true to our core values of worshiping the Lord in the beauty of holiness, forming disciples of Jesus Christ, being the hands and feet of Christ in our city and beyond, and building Christian community among ourselves.

In-person worship resumed just before Holy Week. Improvements continued on our streaming capabilities to connect with people who could not be in attendance. The parish has even seen new members who were introduced to Holy Faith online. During the closure, with fewer people on campus, we took the advantage of the opportunity to install new security measures, a new fire alarm system, and to enhance the range of our cameras for streaming broadcasts.

The commitment of parishioners to mask up, get vaccinated, and to stay home when not feeling well, allowed Holy Faith to remain open and to maintain our sense of Christian community. Morning and Evening Prayer, Bible study groups, Sunday forums, Women's Spirituality, Children's Chapel: all of these resumed while constantly adapting to changing health protocols. The Holy Faith Women's Guild successfully conducted the 139th Annual St Nicholas Bazaar online. After a year's absence, the annual Parish picnic was held at Bishop's Ridge with more children than we've seen in a long time. All this has been made possible by so many. Thanks go to Fr. Jim, Deacon Lynn, Mtr. Madelynn, Mark Childers, Donna Lukas, Ann MacVicar, and Marcos Castillo and Rocio Salazar for their leadership and

steadfastness in the face of changing circumstances. A special thanks goes to Janet McCroskey, Kathleen Ritch, and the Children's Chaplains for their commitment to the children of the parish.

Thanks also go to the Vestry for their wisdom and leadership. Van Swift, Senior Warden, worked diligently building community during these difficult times and Dan Green worked tirelessly overseeing building projects throughout the year.

Looking to the new year, we are still faced with challenges but we continue to trust God and we will be faithful to where God is leading us.

It's also an appropriate time to engage in strategic planning. We have questions we need to ask ourselves: 'where is God calling us as a parish?', 'what are our gifts that we can share with the larger community?' and 'what are our blind spots that may limit us in effectively proclaiming the Good News of Jesus Christ?'. We need to approach these questions from both a theological and a practical perspective. After a preliminary discussion by the Vestry, a broader conversation should be held with the Parish to consider these issues.

The planned three-month sabbatical for Fr Robin begins this summer. There are plans in place for clergy coverage and the 2022 budget includes funding for a third full-time clergy position beginning in July. After returning in the Fall, Fr Robin looks forward to serving the Parish and the parishioners he loves.

Looking forward to 2022, the Rector charges the Parish of Holy Faith:

******That we each trust God and be faithful to where God is leading.*

* That we each listen and respond to where and how God is calling us as a committed member of

the Holy Faith community.

***** That we listen and respond as a parish to where and how God is calling Holy Faith to proclaim

effectively the Good News of Jesus Christ in this parish, in this city, in this country, and in this

world.

•X. Any Other Business

There being no further business, it was moved and seconded to adjourn. Carried unanimously

•XI. Closing Prayer and Blessing

Father Robin gave the closing prayer and blessing. The Annual Meeting ended at 5:10 PM with the singing of *O God*, *Our Help in Ages Past*.

RULES FOR THE ELECTION OF PERSONS TO THE VESTRY AND AS DEANERY/DIOCESAN DELEGATES

RESOLVED – The rules for the election of persons to the Vestry and as Convention Delegate will be as follows:

- 1. All votes cast shall be on ballots furnished by the Church.
- 2. Each ballot must show votes for the exact number of persons specified for that ballot, or that ballot will be considered invalid and shall not be counted.
- 3. Prayer shall precede each ballot.
- 4. The procedure for counting the ballots is:
 - a) The retiring Vestry members will count the ballot. One of the counters will serve as teller and will call out the vote on each ballot. The remaining two counters will each record the votes.
 - b) The teller reads the ballot; the counters simultaneously record the count. Each candidate's name is marked on each counter's list as the names are read out.
 - c) The counters' totals are tallied producing the top 3 vote getters.
- 5. The Teller shall report to the Rector, in writing, after each ballot has been counted and verified, providing the following information.
 - a) The total number of valid ballots cast.
 - b) The number needed for election, being a majority of the number of valid ballots cast.
 - c) The total number of votes received by each nominee.
- 6. The Rector shall declare as elected any nominee who has received a majority of the number of valid ballots cast.
- 7. The Rector shall not announce the vote total of any nominee at any time, nor shall the Teller, unless this ruling is overturned by a two/thirds majority of eligible members present.
- 8. On each succeeding ballot, the candidate with the lowest total of votes shall be dropped from the ballot until all new places have been filled. This entire procedure will apply to both Vestry and Delegate positions.

Associate Rector's Report The Reverend Jim Gordon

Lay Pastoral Visitors

Lay Pastoral Visitors reach out to parishioners who are temporarily or permanently homebound. Many of the Visitors are authorized to take Communion to the homebound as well to supplement the visits of the Parish Clergy. Morning, Evening Prayer Presiders

In the ministry's brief life, a wide range of services have been offered including driving to church and appointments, picking up groceries, making phone calls, etc. The pandemic greatly affected this ministry, but late in 2021 it received a new birth and a new approach brought by then-Deacon Lynn Finnegan, who in 2022 took the ministry to a new level. Assistant Rector's Report The Reverend Lynn Finnegan

What a year it has been! First on my mind for 2022 events was the beautiful and Spirit-filled Service of Ordination to the Priesthood hosted by The Church of the Holy Faith on June 14th. It was a glorious celebration of ministry, both mine and yours. Many friends and family members attended and watched from afar (thank you livestream ministry!) and commented on how moving the service was for them personally. The Holy Spirit was IN the house! The joy of celebrating my first Eucharist the following Sunday was equally, if not more, moving. Fr. Robin left for his sabbatical a mere thirteen days later and, yes, it did feel like being thrown into the deep end of the pool. I am very grateful to Fr. Robin for entrusting me with leading the bible study and spiritual classics classes and for Fr. Jim for his pastoral leadership and guidance in liturgy during Fr. Robin's absence. With Fr. Robin's assistance, I continue to lead Women's Bible Study.

Ashes to Go

Holy Faith started what we hope will be an annual tradition of participating in the worldwide movement of "Ashes to Go" by providing ashes and prayer at the Santa Fe Plaza on Ash Wednesday. Pam Jones and Rhonda Black joined me in offering ashes, along with a brief service of confession and prayer from the Book of Common Prayer. We were graced with ideal March weather! It was a powerful opportunity to witness to God's mercy and love and we administered ashes to many, churched and unchurched, and prayed with others.

Faith Family

Our team of Faith Family volunteers was commissioned the First Sunday of Advent 2021 and continued faithfully to serve throughout 2022. Faith Family offered pastoral support in many ways, but predominantly in giving rides, with over 100 rides provided in 2022. A team of "Lead Disciples" rotates as the point of contact for the parish each month. In April we held a training that included a presentation by a representative from Egis senior home care and in October we participated in the Ministry Fair. The team provided rides to doctor's appointments, pharmacies, grocery stores, church, errands, car repair, and church events for parishioners uncomfortable driving after dark. We also sent out Easter and Christmas cards to clergy-identified parishioners and baked cookies for the students at St. John's College during their finals week. Thank you to Pam Jones, Alice McSweeney, Bonnie Hardwick, Mari Russell, Rhonda Black, Sally Ritch, Frank McCabe, Leslea McCabe, Judy White, and Anita Pisa who served as lead disciples and also provided care. My gratitude also goes to the team of support disciples: Barry Baltzley, Christine Bynum, Bill and Barbara Dedmon, Elaine Gere, Dan Green, Bonnie Hardwick, Nike Kern, Simon Mostert, Kathleen Orozco, Charlotte and Tom Rundell, and Toni Weiser.

<u>Outreach</u>

In addition to all clergy duties as your Assistant Rector, I have a special focus in Outreach activities. This past year a team of parishioners consisting of Pam Jones, Nike Kern, and Lisa Emory helped in providing "hands on" outreach activities in addition to the financial support Church of the Holy Faith gives through the Mission and Outreach Committee. On three occasions, we provided items for parishioners to pack in "Homeless Kits" that can be handed out to those on the streets. We provided gift cards to school children in Ruidoso who lost their homes in the McBride Wildfire, collected feminine products and other goods to give to the women at the Interfaith Shelter, sponsored an Alternative Giving Fair for parishioners to meet non-profit agencies we support through the Mission and Outreach Committee and partnered with the Family Ministry in a "Reverse Advent Calendar," collecting food items during Advent. During the summer I gave a presentation on building homes in the colonias of Juarez and will, hopefully along with a few Holy Faith parishioners, join St. Bede's Episcopal Church to build a home in Juarez in March 2023.

I continue to look for learning opportunities and in 2022 I became a certified Police and Fire Chaplain (serving in a volunteer capacity in Los Alamos), completed the "Prepare/Enrich" marriage counseling course (and had the joy of officiating at several weddings), attended a seminar on Bowen Family Systems (along with Fr. Robin) and started a new course on "Preaching Paul" through the Thriving in Bivocational Ministry program at the Seminary of the Southwest. I was also privileged to be installed as the new chaplain for the Daughters of the King.

Family and Children's Ministries

Family and Children Ministry began 2022 by firming up the transition from online worship and education to in person worship and education. Children's Chapel returned in regularity to the Chapel of the Good Shepherd. It felt wonderful for all involved to lift voices together in song and prayer and gather once again at God's altar to learn and discuss our faith.

During the Palm Sunday Ecumenical celebration on the Plaza, the Holy Faith children's choir sang at the bandstand with the children's choir from the Cathedral Basilica of St. Francis of Assisi.

Lenten activities also resumed post pandemic, as children of all ages and their parents joined in for the burning of palms in preparation of Ash Wednesday. The children were fascinated. Soft pretzels were made in celebration of Shrove Tuesday, as well as other events for the Lenten adventure series.

For Easter, hundreds of eggs were hidden by volunteers, and joyous children took to our outdoor spaces to hunt for eggs. It was a notably glorious Easter celebration.

Children hiked and played sports at the annual picnic. They received crown boxes to decorate with jeweled stickers in order to collect spiritual treasures from church volunteers and parents at home. Treasures are given out spontaneously when good deeds and enthusiastic spiritual interests are witnessed.

The vestry endorsed the idea of creating a position for Family and Children's Ministries. Parents and Church volunteers discussed future visions for this position. Lisa Emory submitted a letter of intent and proposal documents expressing her interest in filling the position. Upon Father Robin's return from sabbatical, Lisa Emory was invited to fill the position.

Several new acolytes began serving at the altar this year. These acolytes began their service earlier in life than most recent acolytes at Holy Faith. These youngsters are very enthusiastic and proud of their accomplishments and new roles within our church community. Their participation has brought joy to us all.

The Outreach and Family and Children's Ministries combined forces to host a Reverse Advent Calendar Project. This was a fun and popular new project in which parishioners collected a specific non-perishable food item for each day in Advent. The focus is on giving as an Advent devotion, rather than receiving. During Children's Chapel, young children brought coins from home and shopped at Holy Food Grocers. Collected goods were displayed under the Christmas tree in Palen Hall in festively wrapped boxes. During the 4:00 Christmas Eve Family Service children brought collected goods to the creche to as gifts for the infant Jesus. Our large bounty was donated to the Food Depot. This year for the 4:00 Christmas Eve family service, the Children's choir once again sang the offertory. Parents worked together with Clergy to rewrite the pageant script to accommodate our children as they grow and change. One notable change was the participation of youth readers for the service.

Children and Family Ministries received approval to add Children's Chapel to the 11:00 service. Volunteers began training in December with the aim of adding Children's Chapel to the 11:00 service at the beginning of 2023.

SENIOR WARDEN REPORT

This is my last year to serve on the Vestry and my second year serving as Senior Warden. It has been an excellent education on the operation of the Church and its many facets that have to come together to provide the wonderful, reverent and beautiful experience that we enjoy at Holy Faith. The many ministries that make us such an active Church and allow us to stand out as a beacon of Christianity is unique today in Santa Fe and draws many members from various and different traditions. It takes a village to allow us to have the excellent worship, education, and hospitality that Holy Faith provides and is a blessing to us all.

For example, I would like to highlight the work of the Junior Warden. The untold hours that this person has to work in order for the physical plant to operate successfully is sometimes not understood by us and I wish to thank Vann Bynam for all his hard work and dedication in all this endeavor. We will have air conditioning next summer and it is quite difficult to install successfully in a building built in 1882.

The Women's Guild, with very hard work and trying several new ideas for sale items, achieved a successful sale event with the St. Nicholas Bazaar. It was very exciting, with several new members and allows the Guild to continue to provide assistance for many non-profits helping others in Santa Fe.

Holy Faith also hosted the documentary film that was dedicated to Father Ken Semon and Joe Jordan-Berenis, (former Executive Director of the Santa Fe Interfaith Community Shelter, generally known Pete's Place). This film depicted the work of the congregations of Holy Faith, First Presbyterian, the Cathedral Basilica and Temple Beth Shalom in establishing Pete's Place. It showed how instrumental Holy Faith had been in the establishment of the shelter and how the Church followed the directive in Matthew of helping the poor by creating this successful non-profit to help the homeless in Santa Fe.

This past year, the Children's Ministry was revamped under new leadership, resulting in new programs and an exciting Christmas pageant. Also, many of the children have begun serving in the Acolyte program and it is exciting to see children participating in the Church services.

The congregants of Holy Faith learned new ways of doing things differently during COVID, and some of the changes have continued and therefore effectively expanded the reach of Holy Faith. During Advent, over 140 people on Christmas and New Years services watched on line. This ministry has become a great success and helped those persons who are unable to attend in person to worship with us.

This year, the Vestry created a committee to work on Creation Care. Every Sunday we say in Prayers of the People that we pray for God's creation. The Vestry decided to work on Creation Care for Santa Fe and the Chair is Vestry member Mark Everett. You will hear more about the program during this year.

Finally, all programs are back including the historically successful Women's Quiet Day which precedes Lent and is offered to women throughout the Diocese and churches in Santa Fe. This year's leader is Deborah Smith Douglas and the title of the 2023 program, "Deepening Prayer, Strengthening Communion," will occur on February 11, 2023.

It has been my honor to serve as the Senior Warden for Holy Faith for 2022. Under the leadership of the Rector, the Vestry and the Staff, I believe that we have had another successful year. Thank you for all your support.

ST. FRANCIS LEGACY SOCIETY

The St. Francis Legacy Society Committee is pleased to report that (42?) members of the Parish have furnished Statement of Intent forms or other indications of including The Church of the Holy Faith in their estate plans. New members are always welcome; simply fill out a form which can be obtained at the church office. The Statement of Intent form provides donors the opportunity to designate as beneficiary Holy Faith's Article VI Endowment Fund (available for capital expenditures and mission and outreach only), Holy Faith's Article VII Operations Endowment Fund (available for capital expenditures, mission and outreach, general operating expenditures, or specific expenditures designated by the donor), or both. Questions may be referred to Sandra Brinck, Chair of the committee, or the Holy Faith Treasurer. There is usually an annual gathering of the Society, which has not occurred in the last few couple of years because of the pandemic but hopefully will resume again this year, and members are recognized by the presentation of a lapel pin of our St. Francis statue.

DEANERY DELEGATES

The Church of the Holy Faith is part of La Sierra Encantada Deanery of the Episcopal Diocese of the Rio Grande, consisting of the northeastern portion of the State of New Mexico. The deanery normally meets four times each year for the purpose of sharing information from parishes within the deanery and receiving information from the diocese and preparing for Diocesan Convention. This past year the deanery met via Zoom its meetings, but expects to meet in person in 2023. Deanery delegates also have voice and vote at Diocesan Convention. Holy Faith's delegates this past year, in addition to the clergy and wardens were Charles Chambers (succeeded by Mark Everett for the unexpired term) and Chris Frenk (terms expire 2023), Alice McSweeney (term expires 2024), and Marty Buchsbaum (term expires 2025).

PARISH MINISTRY REPORTS

ADULT CHRISTIAN FORMATION

At Holy Faith we are blessed with many opportunities for the study of God's Word, and the writings of authors who excite and enrich our faith as disciples of Christ. New participants are always welcome!

SPIRITUAL CLASSICS STUDY GROUP – Every Tuesday at 10:00 a.m., Father Robin leads a study of a classic book on Christian spirituality chosen by the group. This past year, the group read and discussed Howard Thurman's *Jesus and the Disinherited*, H. Richard Niebuhr's *Christ and Culture*, Henri Nouwen's *The Return of the Prodigal Son*, and James H. Cone's *The Cross and the Lynching Tree*. We are currently beginning Thomas Kempis' *The Imitation of Christ*. New participants are always welcome!

Father Robin also leads the **MEN'S BIBLE STUDY** every Wednesday at 3 p.m., as well as a coed **EVENING BIBLE STUDY** on Mondays at 5:30 p.m., while Mother Lynn leads the **WOMEN'S BIBLE STUDY** every Thursday at 10 a.m. During the past year, we studied Ecclesiastes, the Gospel of Mark, and the prophet Malachi. We are now reading the prophet Micah and will soon start St. Paul's Letter to the Ephesians. New participants are always welcome!

The weekly **ADULT FORUMS**, usually held each Sunday morning at 9:50 a.m. other than the first Sunday of the month, continued to be an important venue for Christian education. Father Robin began 2021 with a series of forums on Christian basics and later gave the parish an inside look at his sabbatical experience and discussed "Benedictine Spirituality in the Parish." The Rev. Dr. Eric Springsted contributed several forums, including looks at the theology of

Austin Farrer and that of former Archbishop of Canterbury Rowan Williams, and a three-part series on the nature of faith. Mother Lynn presented forums on the Didache and how to establish a Rule of Life, as well as talking to the parish about homebuilding in Juárez, Mexico. Mother Madelynn discussed the humanity of the Virgin Mary. Father Jim presented forums on the Shroud of Turin, on the biblical view of angels, on the theology of C.S. Lewis' "The Lion, the Witch, and the Wardrobe," on the Sign of the Cross, on Farrer's book "The Crown of the Year," on canticles, on the nature of Christ's kingship, and on the importance of John the Baptist. Parishioner Guy Gronquist and Mark Childers, director of Music and Liturgy, reported on the Episcopal Church's General Convention. Parishioner Cissy Lewis told us why we should "Thank God for the Poets," and parishioner Steven Berkshire discussed the Education for Ministry program.

WOMEN'S SPIRITUALITY

The classes on Women's Spirituality that were led by Mtr Madelynn continued to be well attended and consisted of three classes in 2022. In February, the class was based on the book, "The Praying Life" by Deborah Douglas and led to a meeting with the author because the class was so enthusiastic about the book and the course. In July and August, the class was based on the book, "Lost in Wonder" by Ester de Waal and in October and November, the class studied the humanity of Mary, using various course materials including the New Testament. The women who attended expressed great appreciation about the deepening of their spirituality due to the effective leadership of Mtr Madelynn.

ATTRIBUTES OF THE HOLY SPIRIT AND THE INDWELLING OF THE HOLY SPIRIT

The class began in November of 2021. We studied I and II Timothy and watched DVDs called "How to Keep Your Head on Straight in a World Gone Crazy". This course recently concluded. We will begin a study on the Book of Revelation in January of 2023. We meet every Monday at 10:30 until noon in the Campbell Room

EDUCATION FOR MINISTRY

Education for Ministry (EfM) is in its second year at Holy Faith. EfM is a program offered through the School of Theology at the University of the South (Sewanee). Seven members of the Parish are participating, led by EfM mentor Steven Berkshire. LITURGICAL MINISTRIES

PARISH ADMINISTRATOR AND DIRECTOR OF LITURGY & MUSIC REPORT

As Parish Administrator, I work behind the scenes to coordinate the day-to-day activities of our parish, often times attending meetings of the various ministries and committees to ensure a smooth transition of responsibilities from one committee to another where the needs of one committee's time and talents are required for the activity of another. I work closely with the Rector and Wardens, who act on behalf of the Vestry, to help them fulfill their Canonical responsibility of "keeping in good order, a house of worship and all the necessary furnishings and appointments of the same; providing all things requisite to the carrying on of the work of the Parish."

We honor our Anglican heritage and praise God with solemn liturgy, traditional Prayer Book worship, and music to exalt the spirit.

As Director of Music and Liturgy, I have the privilege of working with our Priests, Lay Ministers, and Choir, in the scheduling, planning, and preparing of all liturgies provided for in The Book of Common Prayer.

In preparing for our services, I schedule, coordinate, and work with:

The Acolytes – It is a joy and privilege to work with our Acolytes, to assure proper staffing and training for our various liturgies. It is a special joy to work with our youth, training, encouraging, and raising them up to enter deeper into service at God's Altar.

The Altar Guild – In response to all of God's mighty acts, we are called to offer ourselves to God's service. The basic motivation for serving in the altar guild – or in any other work of the church – is gratitude. Members of the altar guild are grateful servants: servants of God, servants of God's people, servants of the liturgy, and servants of the worship space. Whether it is preparing the altar, polishing vessels, removing wax from linens, or pressing vestments, the work is never a burden but is always a privilege. To serve on the Altar Guild is to take the opportunity to serve God in a very intimate and prayerful way. We are very much in need of more volunteers to serve on the Altar Guild.

The Lector Ministry – Our lectors are called to proclaim the "Word of the Lord." This ministry serves at all principle services and other special services of the year as provided for by our Liturgical calendar.

The Usher Ministry – Holy Faith's ushers play a vital role in the smooth orchestration of our worship services each Sunday, and for many other services throughout the year. Ushering is a Ministry of Hospitality that represents the "welcoming Jesus" to guests, visitors and long-time parishioners alike. Ushers are among the first members of The Church of the Holy Faith that you meet when you come to a Sunday service and set the tone for warmth and reverence. Ushers prepare the church for services, discreetly greet parishioners, distribute the service bulletins, take the census, bring the offering of elements to the altar, and facilitate collection of the offering. They also seat worshippers during services and assist the disabled who are wheelchair bound or in need of any assistance. They help clear the pews and reset the books used in worship after each service. New ushers are received and trained throughout the year.

The Choir – As Church Musicians we are called to be "the mystics of the Liturgy." It is in our Anglo-Catholic heritage that the church musician assists in bringing the people of God to the place where heaven and earth meet. The Choir, and the music it provides, is an integral part of the Sacramental life of the Church. Renowned English Composer, John Rutter, said in his keynote address during the AAM Winchester Conference held in 2017, that a "church without a choir is like a body without a soul." The Church of the Holy Faith is blessed to have in its choir a solid base of professional choral musicians. These musicians serve as section leaders and use their choral talents to assist in fulfilling each and every chorister's call to the music ministry.

Our magnificent pipe organ, built by M.P. Möller in 1961, still remains to be one of the great treasures of The Church of the Holy Faith, not to mention being one of the finest installations in New Mexico, and great care is given to its maintenance. Once again, we have contracted with Mountain States Pipe Organ Services, LLC, who provide four regularly scheduled service calls annually to make minor repairs, tune the reeds, and to do such general tuning as may be required.

2022 found us worshiping together, once again, in the fullness of our liturgies. While we can always use more volunteers, especially serving as Acolytes, Ushers, and on the Altar Guild, I am deeply grateful for the volunteers that we have. They are ever willing to serve over and over, time and time again. Their dedication to the various ministries of our beloved church is truly inspiring, and I give thanks to God for each and every one of them. Through patience and perseverance, and by the grace of God we have prevailed. We have not been silenced by a pandemic nor have we allowed it to become our icon. Jesus Christ is our icon, the same "yesterday, today, and forever." The Word of the Lord is proclaimed, the Gospel is preached, Holy Eucharist is celebrated, the voices sing, and God is glorified!

PARISH LIBRARY -

The Holy Faith Library achieved a significant milestone this year: With all its books cataloged online, all parishioners listed in the annual directory also entered into the library database as registered users, and self-checkout and self-checkin procedures simplified, the final step was to have a direct link from the Holy Faith website to the library catalog. Now, readers can go to the church's home page, click on "Library" at the top, and be sent to the library's home page. There one can search for specific authors, titles, and subjects and immediately see what is available. An additional bonus on the homepage is to see a rolling image of new items added to the collection.

Library "Open House" events this year included: Kent Grubbs, February 22, "The Pilgrim's Way: Early Celtic Christian Sites of the British Isles"; Sallie Bingham, June 7, on her memoir Little Brother; and Elaine Coleman, August 23, on her new book The Hand of Ganesh.

Scheffler Lectures resumed this year, with two planned, to make up for the missed year during pandemic closures. The Rev. Dr. Bonnie Thurston was scheduled for May 11, but needed to cancel at the last moment because of illness. She has been rescheduled for April 28, 2023. On October 14, Dr. Christopher Wells, long-time executive director and publisher of the Living

Church Foundation and newly appointed Director of Unity, Faith, and Order for the Worldwide Anglican Communion, spoke on "The Living Word: Communication and Communion."

The library presented a number of book displays throughout the year: books for Lenten prayer and reflection; books by Bonnie Thurston, in anticipation of her Scheffler Lecture; books by Austin Farrar, supplementing Rev. Eric Springsted's forum on the theologian; books on Benedictine Spirituality; and books for Advent prayer and reflection.


