

UNOFFICIAL MINUTES

•I. Opening Hymn and Prayer

After the opening hymn, *The Church's One Foundation*, Father Robin led the members present in prayer.

•II. Call to Order by the Rector

Fr. Robin then called the meeting to order at 4:05 PM.

•III. Approval of the Minutes of the 2022 Annual Meeting

A motion was made and seconded to accept the Minutes of the 2022 Annual Meeting. Carried unanimously.

•IV. Vestry Presentation of Nominees

Father Robin recognized the retiring Vestry members Van Swift, Walter Sterling, and Charles Rountree. Retiring Vestry members were presented with a lithograph of Holy Faith by artist Grant MacDonald in appreciation of their service to the parish.

The slate of Vestry nominees was presented: Mike Morrissey, Kaki Grubbs, and Charles Rountree. It was noted that Charles Rountree was eligible for nomination having been appointed to the Vestry in 2022 to fill the unexpired term of Charles Chambers. Fr. Robin called for nominations from the floor and, none being proposed, a motion was made and seconded to close nominations. *Carried unanimously*. Acceptance of the three candidates to the Vestry was moved and seconded. *Carried unanimously*.

Mark Everett and Chris Frenk were presented as nominees for Deanery Delegates. Fr. Robin called for nominations from the floor and, none being proposed, a motion was made and seconded to close nominations. *Carried unanimously*. Acceptance of the candidates as Deanery Delegates was made and seconded. *Carried unanimously*.

•V. Rules of Election and Balloting and the First Ballot - Fr. Robin

Since there were no other nominations and candidates were accepted unanimously, Fr. Robin stated it was not necessary to review the rules of election and balloting.

•VI. Wardens' Reports – Van Swift, Sr. Warden; Vann Bynum, Jr. Warden

Van Swift, Senior Warden, began her report by expressing her gratitude to the parish for the opportunity and honor to serve as Senior Warden. The parish has rebounded following the challenges of the pandemic and continues to expand ministries and outreach. Van noted the robust participation of parishioners in service to Holy Faith and the community, remarking that Holy Faith stands as a beacon of Christianity in Santa Fe.

Van made special mention of the work of the Women's Guild in planning and executing a successful St Nicholas Bazaar. She also highlighted the work of the Children's Ministry as it continues to expand programs with more children participating in the life of the parish. In addition, Women's Spirituality draws attendees from throughout the community: preparation for the 2023 program, 'Deepening Prayer' led by Mtr Madelynn, is underway.

Van concluded by remarking on the tremendous work Vann Bynum has undertaken as Junior Warden as he navigates the challenges of enhancing and maintaining a 140 year-old facility.

Vann Bynum, Junior Warden, reviewed projects undertaken and completed in 2022 as well as projects scheduled for 2023. Projects undertaken ranged from small to large: from replacing door latches to recarpeting and repainting Conkey House and Palen Hall, installation of air conditioning in the Sanctuary, and wainscoting in the hallway outside the Sacristy. He made special mention of the phenomenal accomplishments of Sarah McCarthy as she strives to enhance the gardens. He concluded by thanking the Vestry, Fr Robin, Mark Childers, and especially Donna Lukas for their support and guidance.

•VII. Financial Reports – Steven Berkshire, Treasurer

- (a) Steven reported that Holy Faith remains fiscally sound ending 2022 with an overall surplus of \$62K. He expressed his deep appreciation to the congregation for their financial commitment to the ongoing mission and outreach of Holy Faith. Swain & Greico conducted an audit of the financial statements returning a positive review of parish finances and accounting practices. A copy of the audit is available in the church office upon request to review. Steven also noted that the endowment funds, managed by Northern Trust, reported a 13.8% increase in value during 2022. The endowment funds are monitored by the Investment Committee ably led by Peter Lockyer.
- (b) Steven then presented a balanced 2023 budget as approved by the Vestry. He noted that the budget reflects an increase in compensation, no replacement for the Associate Rector after Fr Jim retires, and pledged giving of \$946,924.

•VIII. Parish Reports – Father Dodge

Fr. Robin encouraged attendees to the meeting to read and review the various reports presented in the Annual Report.

•IX. The Rector's Charge to the Parish – Father Dodge

Despite the sorrow and loss experienced during the pandemic, there have been unexpected blessings as well. Things taken for granted in the past have now become more precious, especially the ties that create our beloved faith community. The efforts made to maintain our commitment to each other brought us enhanced streaming opportunities for worship allowing us to participate in worship from around the world. But our common life together is strongest when we are together. That is why the theme for this year's Stewardship Campaign is "Renewal and Recommitment for 2023": a recommitment to Holy Faith with the gift of time, talent, and treasure, but especially a recommitment to coming back to Holy Faith to participate in person in the life of the parish.

This year's stewardship theme was inspired by the personal renewal and recommitment Fr Robin experienced on his three-month sabbatical. He thanked the congregation for allowing him the opportunity to take a sabbatical which included long retreats at three different Benedictine monasteries refreshing his desire to minister to Holy Faith.

Fr Robin thanked the dedicated clergy and staff of Holy Faith for their steady counsel and hard work both during his sabbatical and in their ongoing ministry to the parish. Mtr Lynn, whose ordination was celebrated in June, alongside Fr Jim and Mtr Madelynn provided immeasurable guidance in the spiritual life of Holy Faith. Fr Robin also recognized the dedication of Mark Childers, Donna Lukacs, Ann McVicar, Marcos Castillo, and Rocio Salazar. Looking forward, Lisa Emory has been named Coordinator of Family and Children's Ministries and will expand on the work she has already accomplished as a volunteer. The service of Fr Jim, retiring in 2023, will be celebrated as we say farewell to him and his wife Andi for their dedicated years of ministry to Holy Faith.

Fr Robin also thanked the Vestry in their efforts ensuring that Holy Faith continued to grow and thrive. Sr Warden Van Swift, who chaired Vestry meetings during Fr Robin's sabbatical, along with Jr Warden Vann Bynum, Treasurer Steven Berkshire, and Secretary Charles Rountree, Mark Everett, Peter Lockyer, Chris Frenk, Ruth Rael, and Walter Sterling worked tirelessly tending to the temporal affairs of the parish. Van Swift, Walter Sterling, and Charles Rountree end their terms on the Vestry this year and their service is deeply appreciated. Remaining Vestry members, along with Fr. Robin, welcome new members Mike Morrissey, Kaki Grubbs, and returning member Charles Rountree to the 2023 Vestry.

In the March Vestry retreat, prayerful consideration was given to how we are stewards of the funds generated from our endowments. While our beautiful (and aging) campus will always require diligent attention, it is our responsibility and privilege to direct funding outside the parish. There is more work to be done in this area but conversations have begun and will continue on how we define Mission and Outreach.

Developing a balanced budget for 2023 has been challenged by slower than normal responses for pledged giving. Concerns about the state of the economy may play a part in this but stewardship is more than a financial issue: it is a spiritual issue. Our common life as parishioners of Holy faith is only strengthen by a renewed commitment to spiritual growth and sacrificial giving. With this in mind, the Rector's charge to the parish in 2023 is:

- *That we each renew our faith by coming back to Holy Faith to participate in the worship, the Christian formation, and the various ministries the parish offers;
- ❖ That we each recommit ourselves to Holy Faith by giving of our time, talent, and treasure;
- *That we each reconnect with our Holy Faith community and friends to strengthen this Body of Christ.

•X. Any Other Business

There being no further business, it was moved and seconded to adjourn. Carried unanimously

•XI. Closing Prayer and Blessing

Father Robin gave the closing prayer and blessing. The Annual Meeting ended at 5:10 PM with the singing of *O God*, *Our Help in Ages Past*.

RULES FOR THE ELECTION OF PERSONS TO THE VESTRY AND AS DEANERY/DIOCESAN DELEGATES

RESOLVED – The rules for the election of persons to the Vestry and as Convention Delegate will be as follows:

- 1. All votes cast shall be on ballots furnished by the Church.
- 2. Each ballot must show votes for the exact number of persons specified for that ballot, or that ballot will be considered invalid and shall not be counted.
- 3. Prayer shall precede each ballot.
- 4. The procedure for counting the ballots is:
 - a) The retiring Vestry members will count the ballot. One of the counters will serve as teller and will call out the vote on each ballot. The remaining two counters will each record the votes.
 - b) The teller reads the ballot; the counters simultaneously record the count. Each candidate's name is marked on each counter's list as the names are read out.
 - c) The counters' totals are tallied producing the top 3 vote getters.
- 5. The Teller shall report to the Rector, in writing, after each ballot has been counted and verified, providing the following information.
 - a) The total number of valid ballots cast.
 - b) The number needed for election, being a majority of the number of valid ballots cast.
 - c) The total number of votes received by each nominee.
- 6. The Rector shall declare as elected any nominee who has received a majority of the number of valid ballots cast.
- 7. The Rector shall not announce the vote total of any nominee at any time, nor shall the Teller, unless this ruling is overturned by a two/thirds majority of eligible members present.
- 8. On each succeeding ballot, the candidate with the lowest total of votes shall be dropped from the ballot until all new places have been filled. This entire procedure will apply to both Vestry and Delegate positions.

Associate Rector's Report The Reverend Lynn M. Finnegan

The year 2023 was a time of renewal of well-loved ministries and the introduction of some wonderful new ones. It was an exciting year of a deep dive into my role as Associate Priest! I am grateful for the many ministry hands that help support and grow our Holy Faith ministries, especially in the areas of Family and Children Ministries under the vision and energy of Lisa Emory (and more recently Sarah Stone), our newly reformulated Mission and Outreach Ministry, and our faithful and caring Faith Family Ministry.

The Seasons of Epiphany and Lent

In Epiphany, I launched my modeling career with the library committee's hugely popular program featuring Phyllis Lemberg's beautifully crafted vestments. I am especially grateful for Phyllis' alteration of a few stoles that I won't trip on!

To kick off Lent, I helped plan a "Shrove Sunday" pancake breakfast hosted by the Family and Children's Ministry and ably assisted by the Hospitality Ministry. Pam Jones brought Mardi Gras decorations and a Dixieland jazz band entertained everyone. Lisa Emory provided fun crafts for the kids.

Holy Faith again participated in the worldwide movement of "Ashes to Go" by providing ashes and prayer at the Santa Fe Plaza and at St. John's College on Ash Wednesday. The day was blustery and cold, but we still offered ashes to quite a few. Pam Jones and Rhonda Black joined in offering ashes, along with a brief service of confession and prayer from the Book of Common Prayer. Thanks to Annie Laurie Coogan for bringing us hot drinks and St. John's College for offering us an indoor location!

A busy Holy Week included the walk to Chimayo. Fr. Jim and I washed feet at the Interfaith Community Shelter in observance of Maundy Thursday. This imitation of Christ's actions the night before he died was welcomed by some and viewed suspiciously by others. We had great conversations while washing feet. Thanks to Pam Jones for accompanying us and keeping the warm water flowing!

Faith Family

Our team of Faith Family volunteers continued faithfully to serve throughout 2023. Faith Family offered pastoral support in many ways: giving rides to medical appointments, church services and other church activities, providing caregiver assistance, writing cards every month, making phone calls, visiting in assisted care facilities, sending Christmas and Easter cards, and generally providing love, care, and support. We took our ministry to St. John's College, where we provided treat bags at Easter (they were gone in a flash) and cookies just before the Winter Break. Approximately fifty rides were provided to medical appointments, thirty-five to church services and other church activities, and sixteen instances of miscellaneous help, including help with caregiving. Many other parishioners' support goes unreported as well.

A team of "Lead Disciples" rotates as the point of contact for the parish each month. During the summer, Alice McSweeney graciously hosted a Faith Family gathering at Los Pinos Ranch in the Pecos, and we gathered as a team in the Fall to review pastoral care practices and discuss ways to improve our ministry. Thank you to Alice McSweeney, Barbara Dedmon, Bonnie Hardwick, Pam Jones, Rhonda Black, Sally Ritch, Frank McCabe and Leslea McCabe, who served as lead disciples and also provided care. My gratitude also goes to the team of support disciples: Anita Pisa, Barry Baltzley, Chris Bynum, Margaret Hubby, Elaine Gere, Dan Green, George Case, Marcus Parker, Kathleen Orozco, Mari Russell, Charlotte Rundell, Van Swift, Ann Wallace, Toni Weiser, Judy White, and Kathleen Croxton.

Mission & Outreach

Thanks to the hard work and dedication of several outreach-minded parishioners, along with Fr. Robin and myself, we have put into place a re-formatted Mission & Outreach Ministry. For years Holy Faith has had a Mission & Outreach committee that manages grant applications and distributes grants. We have expanded this ministry to include an "Outreach Opportunities" subcommittee, which will focus on more "hands on" outreach, such as the Homeless Kits we periodically provide and other ministry opportunities, in addition to serving at the Interfaith Shelter. Newby Herrod stepped up to serve as chair of the Mission & Outreach Ministry. Kent Grubbs serves as chair of the Grants Subcommittee and Pam Jones and Janet Russo serve as co-chairs of the Outreach Opportunities Subcommittee. Others involved are Phyllis Lehmberg, Pat Rehorn, Eleanor Ortiz, Karen Gahr, and Brenda Shears working on grants, and Annie Laurie Coogan and Kathryn Lowerre helping with Opportunities.

Other outreach activities included ministry to St. John's College and Annie Laurie Coogan and I traveling with a team from St. Bede's Episcopal Church to build a home in Juarez – in the middle of a surprise snow! The Family and Children's Ministry helped with adopting a family in need for Christmas, providing presents, food, and school supplies. We also welcomed "Chaplain Joe" Dudziak, recognized as one of Santa Fe's "Ten Who Made a Difference" in 2023 to speak at our adult forum about his street ministry to the homeless. I was privileged to spend a day riding along with Chaplain Joe to learn more about his ministry. I also enjoyed, along with Alicia Solomon, chaperoning amazing young women from Palestine and Israel in

Santa Fe as part of the Tomorrow's Women program (a nonprofit that is one of our grant recipients).

Adult Forums, Lenten Retreat, Miscellaneous

In 2023, I led forums on the Apocrypha, the Book of Genesis, the Apostle Paul, the gospel of Mark and the poetry of Drew Jackson "God Speaks Through Wombs," poems based on the gospel of Luke. During Lent, I led a one-half day retreat, in conjunction with the Education for Ministry group, entitled "Kenosis: Self Emptying."

In the ten days between Ascension and Pentecost, Holy Faith participated for the first time in the global ecumenical movement, "Thy Kingdom Come," focused on praying for those who do not know Christ. We placed a banner on the front of the church and invited parishioners and passersby to write the names of those to pray for on cards that were tied to the front railing. Hundreds and hundreds of names were added.

In conjunction with our Taizé service, we also introduced a special Dia de Los Muertos service. The congregation processed to Palen Hall where our Ofrenda was displayed. Several shared very moving memories of loved ones who had died. In Advent, we added a "Holy Dark, Holy Light" themed service, focused on acknowledging the feelings of loneliness, depression, and sadness that sometimes accompany the Advent and Christmas season.

Summertime fun included putting together a slide show for Fr. Jim's retirement party, organizing a Holy Faith group that attended an Isotopes game, and joining with Family and Children's Ministry in the pilgrimage-focused summer program "Christians Near and Far." Finally, I worked with the communications ministry and kept our Facebook page current.

Family and Children's Ministries

The year of 2023 was an eventful year for Family and Children's Ministry. As our first full year back on the Holy Faith campus post pandemic, the ministry grew in numbers and in the joy of being assembled in Christ's name.

In January, Lisa Emory joined staff as the Coordinator of Family and Children's Ministries. Sarah Stone joined her in a shared role in November.

Children's Christian formation activities took on new form as even more of our youngest parishioners began to serve at God's altar as acolytes, additional children's chaplains were trained, and Holy Faith began to host Children's Chapel at both the 8:30 am and 11:00 am Masses.

Throughout the year on Sunday mornings, hearts were warmed, as smiles swept across our congregation watching our children process while in a myriad of sweet and comical occurrences transpired.

A "Shrove Sunday Breakfast" was held to escort us into Lent, New Orleans style. Children passed out beads and silver dollar pancakes as a live jazz band played. Festive masks were displayed which were created as home projects. Children learned about the meaning of each of the Mardi Gras colors. Purple-justice, gold- power, and green- faith. As we cleaned up, we formed a dance line. Again, smiles and laughter.

New liturgical banners were made in crisp red and white for the solemn procession on Palm Sunday. Holy Faith children and youth presented the gifts from our parish and once again joined the Cathedral Basilica Children's Choir to lift voices in praise.

God's light poured upon our community as our gardens bloomed in perfect harmony with Jesus's resurrection on Easter morning. Our Easter egg hunt was well enjoyed.

In the summer, we explored our faith by becoming pilgrims in search of God in our world. One Saturday, we learned the meaning of St. James' scallop shell and mapped pilgrim sites around the world. We rode to Chimayo, NM, where children were happy to find Father Robin and Mother Lynn waiting for them for the next leg of our journey. We followed stone shells imbedded into buildings and pathways to find our way to the Santo Nino Chapel and learned about this local patron saint. We finished our outing together with lunch by the cool river.

On another occasion, we set out on foot to visit our Roman Catholic neighbors at the Cathedral Basilica. We visited their sensory Stations of the Cross garden, ate apricots from trees, and considered the expressive faces of the statues and pondered the events that lead to Jesus's crucifixion.

Inside the Cathedral, we lit prayer candles and explored things both similar and different than our home church. Mother Lynn, pointed out details as we went and ended the day, back in our chancel for a special meditation.

Also in the summer of 2023, Lisa Emory led Children's formation at Camp Stoney, assisting Diocesan staff.

As children returned to school schedules in the fall, Family and Children's ministries held an open house to unveil the re-envisioned multi use ministry space, in the former Godly Play room. Scripture was placed, adorning the walls, and donations were made with excess items.

SENIOR WARDEN REPORT

It has been my honor and my pleasure to serve as Senior Warden of the Vestry for the past year, and I appreciate this opportunity to share with the parish my thoughts on the life of our parish in this report.

I've always believed that if you stand on someone's shoulders, you can reach higher, and I've benefitted from several people who have enabled me to reach higher this year. For my new role, I had the example of my predecessor Van Swift, whose commitment to Holy Faith now continues in many other capacities.

I've also been blessed by two Executive Committee co-members, from whom I have learned a great deal. Vann Bynum has performed the very difficult role of Junior Warden with true distinction, and I'm deeply grateful for his energetic and thoughtful guidance. Steven Berkshire has served as our Treasurer, a job I know to be a tough one in part because it's a role I had under Father Ken Semon. The financial affairs of the church have only gotten more complicated and more demanding since those days in the mid 2000s, and Steven has excelled in the job for all of our benefit. To these men, who are now leaving these roles and the Vestry itself, I offer my congratulations for jobs well done, and my personal thanks.

A year ago, Fr Robin asked me to assume the role of Senior Warden, and it has been enormously satisfying to work with him on a week-to-week basis to oversee the affairs of Holy Faith. The main responsibility of the Senior Warden is to support the Rector, and be a communication link between him and the parish. Short term priorities can change over time, and the top current priority for me in assuming the Senior Warden role has been to raise awareness, leading to commitment and action, about the fragile financial state of Holy Faith.

While we are fortunate to have a substantial endowment, its use is legally restricted to capital improvements of our physical plant and mission and outreach. Our church itself, as well as Palen Hall, Conkey House and our grounds are beautiful, but do require improvements and updating, for which we have the support of the endowment. The ongoing operations of our parish, however, are only supported by our regularly recurring revenues, primarily our "pledge and plate" contributions. Recently, this bedrock source of financial stability has been inadequate. Our ongoing revenues have fallen short of our expenses, even as we have trimmed most of our nonfixed expense items considerably.

And so, as I enter my second year as Senior Warden, I want to express my deep appreciation to the parishioners who answered the call I and other parish leaders made last summer. Many of you have renewed your commitment to build an ever-deepening relationship with Jesus Christ, including an increased commitment to keep this parish financially sustainable. We have made significant progress, thanks to your efforts, but there is more work to be done: we have not yet reached our 2024 pledge goal. Let's together make 2024 the year we achieve true financial sustainability, by making more of our parishioners aware of how enhancing their commitment to Holy Faith will in turn enrich their lives greatly.

JUNIOR WARDEN REPORT

My thanks go to all of the parish, and especially the clergy, staff, and vestry for the privilege of another year helping take care of this fantastic, beautiful Church and grounds. We have been blessed with a great group of contractors who have done excellent work and have shown the care and respect for the facilities and activities that this place deserves.

We accomplished several projects this past year that will ensure we have the blessings of worshiping in this beautiful space for many years to come. This year's projects have a different complexion from those I reported to you last year. We were fortunate not to have any major water remediation projects to address, but there was no shortage of opportunities for surprises! Below is a table showing where your endowment funds were spent. You will note that there was a slight overrun of the funds derived from the endowment, and that overrun was covered by the general operating funds of the parish. The overrun was at least partly due to unexpected costs from the fire alarm and security system. It only took over two years, but the Fire Marshal finally completed their reviews and inspections. They identified required

changes which resulted in additional costs. In the end, the Fire Detection and Alarm system was given a great review by the Fire Marshal. This year we also encountered issues with people sleeping on the Church grounds and in one case remaining in the building after hours. While no lasting damage was done, it is not something that we can allow to continue. It is not safe for our parishioners and church, and it's also not safe for the people doing so. As a result, I along with our security contractor performed a review of our camera systems and found a few significant gaps which resulted in the installation of additional cameras.

We have had ongoing and costly issues with the heating and cooling system in Conkey House. Last summer there were several times when neither our staff nor our tenants (Desert Chorale) could work in the facility due to elevated temperatures, and our service technicians encountered increasing difficulty finding replacement parts. With parts of the heating system dating back to the original construction of Conkey House, we were well past time to replace both the heating and cooling systems. A new high efficiency boiler system and an energy efficient cooling system were designed and installed. The boiler system for Palen Hall was serviced which had not been done in many years and fortunately found to be in good shape.

The new cooling system for the main church is functioning well, too well for some. If you are too cool in the summer, please sit near the aisles as the cooling outlets are along the outside. The pleasant church facility temperature during the warmer months highlighted an issue in Palen Hall, especially in the Choir Room where many people assemble in a relatively small space. The temperature during the summer would become very uncomfortable. That area is part of the Palen Hall air conditioning system, and after assessing the system our AC contractor recommended the most cost-effective remedy is adding a small heat pump system to that area. We had a most generous parishioner offer to fund the installation of that system for the choir which will happen in the coming months. Many thanks to that donor!

This year we also took on some different challenges. The Desert Chorale sorely needed additional storage space and the Rector agreed to provide them with the "stage" area in Palen Hall. The only issue with that is that we are very good at obtaining things, and very poor at getting rid of things. But with the help of the Rector, Mark Childers, other members of the vestry and several parishioners, we were able to clear everything out of that area one Saturday. Some items were sold at Twice Blessed, some were donated to charity, some were donated to a needy and deserving parish in Albuquerque's South Valley, and the things we could not find a home for went in the dumpster.

Our next Junior Warden will not be without challenges and will need the help of all of you. Recently the roof over the Palen Hall kitchen began leaking again, and the last time we had this issue we were told that if it happened again, we really must look at reroofing that area. We have looked at the condition of the roof and found open gaps in the roofing. Bids are currently being solicited. We have finally identified a contractor, the one who installed the Conkey House boiler system, that is qualified and interested in installing an ice melting

system for the north end of our parking lot, along with resurfacing the lot and resolving some existing drainage issues. I had hoped to get that job done two years ago but it was delayed due to not finding an electrical contractor interested in the work, and by the water damage repairs we had to do in Conkey House. And if the new Junior Warden suffers from boredom there is always the attic of Palen Hall and numerous storage closets and niches begging for liberation from stuff!

Much care and attention continue to be needed in such a historic building, and I ask for your support to the next Junior Warden as they continue this journey.

PARISH MINISTRY REPORTS

ADULT CHRISTIAN FORMATION

At Holy Faith we are blessed with many opportunities for the study of God's Word, and the writings of authors who excite and enrich our faith as disciples of Christ. New participants are always welcome!

SPIRITUAL CLASSICS STUDY GROUP – Every Tuesday at 10:00 a.m., Father Robin leads a study of a classic book on Christian spirituality chosen by the group. This past year, the group read and discussed Thomas Kempis' The Imitation of Christ, Evelyn Underhill's The School of Charity, and Thomas Keating's Open Mind, Open Heart: The Contemplative Dimension of the Gospel. We are about to begin Kathleen Norris' Amazing Grace. New participants are always welcome!

Father Robin also leads the MEN'S BIBLE STUDY every Wednesday at 3 p.m., as well as a coed EVENING BIBLE STUDY on Mondays at 5:30 p.m., while Mother Lynn leads the WOMEN'S BIBLE STUDY every Thursday at 10 a.m. During the past year, we studied St. Paul's Letters to the Ephesians and Colossians, I and II Samuel, and the beginning of I Kings. We are now reading the Gospel of Luke. New participants are always welcome!

The weekly **ADULT FORUMS**, usually held each Sunday morning at 10:00 a.m. other than the first Sunday of the month, when we enjoy an extended Coffee Hour, continued to be an important venue for Christian formation. Parishioner the Rev. Dr. Eric Springsted began the year with a three-part series entitled "Is the Reformation Over? Protestant and Catholic Relations, Old and New." Fr. Robin followed up with a three- part series on Anglican and Roman Catholic Relations since Vatican II, looking at Agreed Statements on Salvation, Grace and Hope in Christ, and United in Mission. During the course of the year, Mtr. Lynn presented Scriptural overviews on the Book of Genesis, the Apocrypha, St. Paul, and the Gospel of Mark. Both Fr. Jim and Fr. Robin offered reflections on their favorite Psalms. Fr. Robin also presented a two-part series on the Theology of Money and a four-part series entitled "Episcopal 101," in preparation for the Bishop's Visitation. Mtr. Madelynn offered a condensed version of the Women Spirituality's study of Bonnie Thurston's book on the Spirituality of Time. Parishioner Steven Berkshire offered an information session on Education for Ministry. Chaplain Joe Dudziak presented on the "Face of Homelessness." The arts were well covered with parishioner James Black offering an illustrated talk on his ledger drawings, parishioner Bonnie Hardwick displaying her works from her book, "Connections: Engaging Ethiopian Iconography," the Rev. Dr. Bonnie Thurston reading her poetry about Place, parishioner Sally Ritch reciting from "Prayers from the Ark," Fr. Robin reading "Prayers for the Seasons of the Liturgical Year, and Mtr. Lynn presenting "Poems on God's Unexpected Coming."

WOMEN'S SPIRITUALITY

In February, Holy Faith sponsored its Tenth Women's Quiet Day that featured Deborah Douglas leading the group on the topic "Deepening Prayer." There were 110 attendees from many churches in Santa Fe, including the Presbyterians, Methodists, Roman Catholic Lutheran and women from the Episcopal churches throughout the Diocese. It was an excellent program and it was enthusiastically received by the attendees.

The individual programs based on a book and discussions began in 2023 with a book by Bonnie Thurston, "For Everything a Season". In the summer, there was a day retreat of women involved in these programs at the home of Phyllis Lehmberg to discuss and reflect on Gratitude. In the fall the book discussed was "Dorothy Day, The Reckless Way of Love - An Introduction to an Unruly Saint". These programs have deepened our spiritual life as we mutually study and reflect upon the issues presented in the various books, presentations, and discussions. The Women's Spirituality programs and Quiet Day are skillfully led by Mtr. Madelynn, Assisting Priest.

DISCIPLESHIP COURSE

Jesus said, "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations." - Matthew 28:19 This course has been designed so that anyone, at anytime, anywhere can reach an unbeliever, disciple a new believer, or grow with others in the Lord. The class meets on Mondays at 10:30 to 12:30 in the Campbell room. The class began in the Spring of 2023, is 48 lessons using DVDs and a workbook, and will finish in late winter.

EDUCATION FOR MINISTRY

This is the third year that The Church of the Holy Faith has sponsored the Education for Ministry (EfM) program. During the 2023-24 year, eleven members of the church community are participating along with the EfM mentor, Steven Berkshire.

Education for Ministry is a educational program of the University of the South, better known as Sewanee and has been in existence for over fifty years. EfM is not about preparing for ordained ministry, rather it is exploring one's own ministry and faith, based around our understanding of Episcopal teachings. It is a four-year educational program, but each person makes a commitment on an annual basis. Year one explores the Old Testament, year two explores the New Testament, year three church and Christian history, and year four an

exploration of one's faith development. All four years meet together which provides a rich opportunity for questioning, discussion and learning. EfM is not Bible study, rather the group examines the history, context, and culture of the texts. It is a great complement to Bible Study though.

EfM also contributes to the life of the Holy Faith community. For example, during Lent this past year, the group sponsored a Lenten Retreat in conjunction with Mother Lynn who led attendees in an exploring of Kenosis. Plans are underway for another retreat for Lent in 2024. The EfM group looks forward to the fourth year which will start in September 2024. Sign-up will occur in late spring or early summer for the next year. LITURGICAL MINISTRIES

PARISH ADMINISTRATOR AND

DIRECTOR OF LITURGY & MUSIC REPORT

As Parish Administrator, I work behind the scenes to coordinate the day-to-day activities of our parish, often times attending meetings of the various ministries and committees to ensure a smooth transition of responsibilities from one committee to another where the needs of one committee's time and talents are required for the activity of another. I work closely with the Rector and Wardens, who act on behalf of the Vestry, to help them fulfill their Canonical responsibility of "keeping in good order, a house of worship and all the necessary furnishings and appointments of the same; providing all things requisite to the carrying on of the work of the Parish."

We honor our Anglican heritage and praise God with solemn liturgy, traditional Prayer Book worship, and music to exalt the spirit.

As Director of Music and Liturgy, I have the privilege of working with our Priests, Lay Ministers, and Choir, in the scheduling, planning, and preparing of all liturgies provided for in The Book of Common Prayer.

In preparing for our services, I schedule, coordinate, and work with:

The Acolytes – It is a joy and privilege to work with our Acolytes, to assure proper staffing and training for our various liturgies. It is a special joy to work with our young people, training, encouraging, and raising them up to enter deeper into service at God's Altar. They're like sponges, soaking up everything. Their eagerness to learn and willingness to serve, inspires us all. They are living proof that Christ's Church will continue until He comes again.

The Altar Guild – In response to all of God's mighty acts, we are called to offer ourselves to God's service. The basic motivation for serving in the altar guild – or in any other work of the church – is gratitude. Members of the altar guild are grateful servants: servants of God, servants of God's people, servants of the liturgy, and servants of the worship space. Whether it is preparing the altar, polishing vessels, removing wax from linens, or pressing vestments, the work is never a burden but is always a privilege. To serve on the Altar Guild is to take the opportunity to serve God in a very intimate and prayerful way. We are very much in need of more volunteers to serve on the Altar Guild.

The Lector Ministry – Our lectors are called to proclaim the "Word of the Lord." This ministry serves at all principal services and other special services of the year as provided for by our Liturgical calendar.

The Usher Ministry – Holy Faith's ushers play a vital role in the smooth orchestration of our worship services each Sunday, and for many other services throughout the year. Ushering is a Ministry of Hospitality that represents the "welcoming Jesus" to guests, visitors and long-time parishioners alike. Ushers are among the first members of The Church of the Holy Faith that you meet when you come to a Sunday service and set the tone for warmth and reverence. Ushers prepare the church for services, discreetly greet parishioners, distribute the service bulletins, take the census, bring the offering of elements to the altar, and facilitate collection of the offering. They also seat worshippers during services and assist the disabled who are wheelchair bound or in need of any assistance. They help clear the pews and reset the books used in worship after each service. New ushers are received and trained throughout the year.

Our magnificent pipe organ, built by M.P. Möller in 1961, still remains to be one of the great treasures of The Church of the Holy Faith, not to mention being one of the finest installations in New Mexico, and great care is given to its maintenance. Once again, we have contracted with Mountain States Pipe Organ Services, LLC, who provide four regularly scheduled service calls annually to make minor repairs, tune the reeds, and to do such general tuning as may be required.

The Choir – It is in our Anglo-Catholic heritage that the church musician assists in bringing the people of God to the place where heaven and earth meet. The Choir, and the music it provides, is an integral part of the Sacramental life of the Church. The Church of the Holy Faith is blessed to have in its choir a solid base of professional choral musicians. These musicians serve as section leaders and use their choral talents to assist in fulfilling each and every chorister's call to the music ministry. The choir, organ, instrumentalists, do not just support the Liturgy, it LIFTS UP the Liturgy. It speaks to the hearer when words are incomprehensible.

I am deeply grateful for all of our volunteers. They are ever willing to serve over and over, time and time again. Their dedication to the various ministries of our beloved church is truly inspiring, and I give thanks to God for each and every one of them.

The Word of the Lord is proclaimed, the Gospel is preached, Holy Eucharist is celebrated, the voices sing, and God is glorified!

Donna and Mark kept us organized with notices in the bulletins and support for getting the bazaar off the ground. Marcos and Rocio were invaluable in decorating Palen Hall and keeping us tidy. Thanks also to all the volunteers, including many, many parishioners who worked so hard to set-up, sell at and dismantle the sale, and to everyone who supported the bazaar by shopping!

Last year we awarded \$ 38,000 (this amount includes a distribution from our Scheffler trust). Monies went to Adelante, Bag'n Hand, Boys and Girls Club, Esperanza Shelter, La Familia Medical Center, The Food Depot, Girls, inc., Interfaith Community Shelter, Kitchen Angels, Many Mothers, St Vincent Cancer Center, SF Habitat for Humanity, Santa Fe Mountain Center and Youth Shelters and Family Services.

Twenty-seven women are active members of the Guild. Some of our members cannot attend weekly meetings, but take projects home to work on at their leisure. We welcome and encourage new members who are interested in making items for the bazaar and in sharing good fellowship and fun. Special expertise is not required, but always welcome. If you do not sew, here are many other projects for you to work on. Come and join us any Wednesday from 10 am to 2 pm and bring a sack lunch—potato chips are provided!

INTERFAITH COMMUNITY SHELTER -

During Fiscal Year 2022-23 (July 2022 through June 2023), the Interfaith Community Shelter at Pete's Place housed 1,123 individuals overnight. Meals served totaled 40,257 – a 28% increase over the previous fiscal year – and bed nights provided totaled 15,639 – a staggering 88% increase over the previous fiscal year. The primary driver for these large increases in demand for services was the end of pandemic-related policies. For example, during the prior fiscal year, overnight bed space at Pete's Place was restricted due to the pandemic, and these restrictions were removed in FY22-23. Similarly, the city ended a more-relaxed policy with

respect to public camping (put in place during the pandemic) that resulted in a greater demand for overnight shelter. An additional factor was the expansion of service provision at Pete's Place. In May 2023, a warm-weather program known as the Women's Summer Safe Haven was rechristened as Summer Safe Haven for All and was opened to both men and women. This means that, for the first time, the Interfaith Community Shelter at Pete's Place now offers overnight shelter to anyone in need, every month of the year. The net effect of these changes was to drive up demand for services at Pete's Place, and the statistics for FY22-23 are more representative of the steady-state, year-round need in our community.

Behind the statistics, though, are real people, whose needs are being met, in part, by the generosity of many organizations and individuals. Parishioners at Holy Faith have been instrumental for many years in providing both financial and volunteer support, and calendar year 2023 was no exception. HOLY FAITH DOCENTS -

Holy Faith Docents are planning to re-organize and re-energize in 2024. We received much interest at the Ministries Fair, and we plan the addition of new faces and voices and more church tours on Sundays. In November of 2023, Holy Faith was featured on the Historic Santa Fe Foundation's "altar screen" tour. Highlights are the chancel designed by architect John Gaw Meem in 1953 with the reredos carved by renowned artist Gustave Baumann. Holy Faith is also featured as part of Heritage Inspirations' "Churches of the Royal City" walking tours. We shared the rich history of Holy Faith with groups of visitors on six tours in June, July, August and December

PARISH LIBRARY -

The Because of the revenue shortfall for 2023, the Parish Vestry moved to furlough the librarian, Virginia Lopez, in July. Until the legal decision about using the Scheffler Endowment for this operational expense is resolved, the librarian's salary needed to be paid through parish funds. In the absence of a librarian, the Library Committee has tried to maintain library operations as much as possible: reshelving books, renewing periodical subscriptions, shelving new magazines, checking mail, etc. However, new books received or purchased have not been cataloged and that backlog is growing.

Among the notable books purchased for the library this year are all the books currently being used by Education for Ministry (which will be shelved together) and the complete 18-volume set of Sacra Pagina New Testament Commentary.

A major improvement to the library facility this year has been the installation of a rolling ladder system. The new system enables easier access to the high shelves in the library. With the installation of the new ladder system, it has been possible to undertake the long-delayed project of weeding the library collection according to the policies and procedures approved last year. To date, 180 books have been identified and removed from the collection. Many of these will be available on the library book sale shelves in Palen Hall.

The library offered four "Open House" lectures during the year. On January 24, Phyllis Lehmberg presented "Having a Very Vested Interest" about her long career designing and creating liturgical vestments. The well-received event included a clergy "fashion show," a book display, and a display of vestments. On March 14, Leslie Dillen performed her one-woman show, "Action Jesus" to an overflow audience. Popular demand resulted in a reprise on October 24. Polly Barton, with her mother Pamela Morton via Zoom, and assisted by her husband John, spoke on the book about her father, James Parks Morton, With Companions for the Journey: An Annotated Memoir. James Parks Morton was the long-time dean of the Church of St. John the Divine in New York.



Besides her lecture, "And the Angel Departed: Mary's Responses to Change and Crisis," on April 28, she generously met with the Women's Spirituality Group, preached on Sunday, and presented a forum on her poetry. The lecture was recorded and is available in the library.

The Library Committee also participated in the Ministry Fair on November 5th, showing a wide range of books to illustrate the breadth of the collection.
